Most people are getting fairly well caught up with their water by now and our Cow Hollow canal scare is all over with. The Reclamation Service took the dragline away Saturday.

The CCC boys have been making a trail along the lower side of the canal bank along the north side of the Hollow, so that a man can go along the lower side on a horse so as to see those seeps better than from on top.

The new trail is pretty rough going. Russell says, "I don't know if I can get the old spotted mule over that trail or not."

Mrs. Clarence Niccum thinks Al Thompson is a friend in need. It seems that there was getting to be a surplus of cats at her home. One day while getting some feed the subject of cats happened to be mentioned, and Al said, "bring them down here."

The grain season now coming along and the mice are quite a menace at the feed stores.

He says, "the fifth and sixth teats don't give so much milk but I am going to milk them. Maybe she will bring me good luck."

Dale Limbaugh's wheat will soon be ready to harvest. It looks pretty good for semi-dry-farm wheat. He expects to have it harvested with a combine.
