Such a shortage of linen is developing that E. R. Steptinus Jr. of the national defense advisory commission will encourage expansion of the flax acreage in the Willamette valley for next year. Current area in flax is 6,000 acres, estimated to produce 14,000 pounds. Acreage is expected to be increased to 9,000 acres at least.

It is this necessity of providing commodities usually imported that is causing northwestern senators and representatives to urge that mineral resources be developed. This applies especially to chromite, manganese and magnesium, all of which are available in Oregon and Washington. Secretary of Interior Ickes is now studying a proposal for a nitrate fixation plant somewhere on the Columbia river area, using electricity from Bonneville. This would be part of the program for the manufacture of propellants, and the powder plant could be located almost anywhere.
