

Three Initiatives On Fall Ballot

Only three of the 15 proposed initiative measures succeeded in enlisting sufficient support to get on to the November ballot. One of these, sponsored by State Senator Thomas Mahoney, provides for outright repeal of the milk control law. Another, sponsored by Common

Sense, Inc., would repeal the Knox Liquor control law and place the sale of liquor in private hands. The third, sponsored by the Oregon Merchants Legislative League, seeks to legalize pin ball games, punch boards and other games of chance. All of the old age pension acts fell by the wayside as also did proposals to create a state bank, to set up a civil service system for public employees and to ban the sale of food and merchandise on Sundays.

ness of \$47,000,000 and was corrected by Strike who said that the bonded indebtedness of the company was only \$18,000,000. A question as to how large a motor could be used on the co-operative lines brought the response from Donahue that the co-operative members were being advised to run nothing larger than a five horse power motor, and to run this motor a proportioned longer time where a larger motor was needed. In other words where a 10 horse power motor would be needed, to use a five horse power motor and run it twice as long, was the way Donahue explained the matter to some 200 farmers and business men who attended the meeting.

Donahue said that the mobile electric plant for the co-operative would be in Vale this coming Friday or Saturday, but changed his statement as to the time of the arrival of the unit. On advice of Luke who said that while the unit was expected any time no definite date could be set on the unit's arrival.
