SALEM—A public utilities commission order requiring all school buses to be equipped with safety glass by September of this year has been postponed at the request of the county school superintendents' association.

The school superintendents advised the commission that many district budgets had already been drawn up and would not permit the added outlay for safety glass. In addition it was said that replacement of old buses by new ones properly glassed is going on so fast that all buses will soon meet the safety requirements.

The commission has decided to permit buses that were approved for the 1939 school year to continue operation this year.

### CALDWELL NIGHT RODEO

The outstanding feature of the intermountain area during the next few days will be Caldwell's Annual Homesteaders Stock Show Night Rodeo held August 22-23-24. It will be the eighth year in which Caldwell has sponsored the 4-H club work and is now the oldest 4-H club district fair in Southwestern Idaho. The number of FFA and 4-H club exhibits will exceed 500. Liberal cash premiums are awarded.

Caldwell's Night Rodeo is now the only Rodeo Association of America contest operating in this area and will bring to town many of the championship cowboys.

In addition to the five regular rodeo acts, there will be featured a Hide Race, Wild-cow Milking Contest, and for the last performance, the five top professional bronc riders will ride for final money. The amateur bronc riding gives the home cowboys the needed training to qualify themselves for professional bronc riding and creates considerable local interest. Special features are: a Pioneer 6 ox hitch, 5 famous trick riders which will include 3 cowgirls, and 2 world's champion trick riders, Hollis Harker and his trained dogs will perform and the comedy acts will be staged by two of the great American clowns, Jasbo Polkerson and Homer Holcomb.

The well-known Union Pacific Employee's Band from Ogden, Utah will furnish music.

The first rodeo performance will be preceded by a Pioneer Parade which will be staged at 4:00 p. m. This parade will depict the ways and manner of living during the pioneer days.

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### "HOT CAMPS" FOR ELK HUNTERS

Hunters seeking to bag bull elk in Clatsop County this season will be required to camp at designated sites and will be subject to draft for fighting forest fires that may state in the area, according to a bulletin just issued by N. S. Rogers, State Forester.

These regulations are the result of a plan worked out by the Forestry Department, the Game Commission, the N. W. Oregon Forest Protective Association and the owners of timber lands in the area, the Crossett Western Company and the Crown-Zellerbach Company. Objectives of the plan are to keep a close check on hunters and reduce fire hazards to a minimum during the Clatsop County open season on bull elk, from August 14 to September 2.

At the time a hunter obtains his elk hunting permit he will be given a camping permit and assigned to one of four camps to be established. Two of these are in the Western Co-op area, at old camp sites No. 3 and 5, and two are in the Saddle Mountain area on Young's River, at the Marxen Camp and the Lewis and Clark guard station. Hunters will be permitted to build fires and camp only at these supervised camps.

"Under the terms of the agreement with the land owners, guards will keep a record of all hunters entering and checking out of the area," said Mr. Rogers.
