THE PARADE TO SWIVEL CHAIR JOBS in the army has started just as it did in the last war. These jobs are filled by those who have influence, the holders the wearing uniform of our army, but for all the danger that they are exposing themselves to, may just as well be in some maternity ward at home changing diapers on a baby.

This time, however, we have the example of a president's son leading the parade—Elliot Roosevelt, who has "accepted" a commission as a captain in the Air Corps "procurement division," a nice soft occupation—no ships to fly and no bullets to face. Young Roosevelt gets this commission of a captain without having the slightest qualification for such, for there does not appear to be an history of past military service; he is just slipped in ahead of a large number of second and first lieutenants who have given long and faithful service to the air corps, men who have, by reason of their commissions shown a real interest in military affairs. Their interest will suffer a severe shock when they see men from civilian life shoved in over their heads cutting off one more chance of their being promoted to a higher rank.

Captains in the service do not just grow, it takes years of service as a subordinate to QUALIFY an officer for the job.

From the civilian's standpoint, this swivel chair racket will put a damper on the enthusiasm that should go with our recently enacted compulsory training law. For what chance has the average young man, who may be academically qualified for officership, if those with influence and money can walk into the War Department and get a commission, without any qualifications as a soldier?

Major General Hugh S. Johnson, retired, and now a newspaper columnist hit's the nail on the head in one of his recent columns with this thought, says the General, "Now the president's second son won't even have to register for the draft and take his place on a footing of equality with all other young Americans of his age. Without discernible military training, preparation or qualification, and without any known preparation for "procurement," he is made a "captain by the scratch of a pen and an officer and gentleman by the act of Congress."

To all of which we say Amen—for during the last war this writer was a sergeant and had the fine example of a group of "Ninety Day Wonders," men who received commissions after going to an officers school for ninety days, that did not know how to give commands properly, and was instructed to take these Ninety Day headaches out and teach them how to handle a company of men. But that lesson seems to have been forgotten by the president's family, or is this just another "social adjustment?"

"RESTORE THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY!"
