COW HOLLOW By The Happy Farmer

Our Thanksgiving day has come and gone. He had and do have many things to be thankful for. Above all, we should be thankful that when we hear the roar of an airplane overhead we need not run for a bomb shelter.

We Cow Hollowites are also thankful for two days last week that we could make hay again.

Those two days were so badly crowded with hay makers that we all had to run short handed.

Arch Eastman, Dale Limbaugh and George Gabriel got their hay up. Dude Parker got the best part of his up, but he would have been thankful for a little more time to get the rest in.

Elza Niccum, Russel Howell, Frank Parker and Clarence Niccum all had turned their hay over again hoping to get it up but no such luck.

About six weeks or two months ago we stacked George Gabriel's third cutting hay. It had been rained on and turned a time or so. We worked an hour in the rain to finish it up. This time we stacked his clover seed, which was ready then and finished up the day before Thanksgiving in a snow storm.

Frank Parker says, "I don't like this making hay with an overcoat on." Then adds, "maybe we can stack mine the day before Christmas."

The hay chopper has been running just as busy as the weather will permit. Last week they chopped Mort Wixon's, Bill Parker's and Arch Eastman's. Now they are chopping on Johnnie Hamilton's.

The good hay is moving out of the low much faster than it did last year. The supply of good hay is much smaller too. We might have a shortage of hay yet before grass comes again. There is quite a supply of poor quality of hay for us to fall back on.

All damp hay must be thrown away when chopping and these rains have wet some of the stacks so deep that there is lots of loss there.

'Tis an ill wind that blows nobody good. All these rains have made lots of pasture and the old

cows are reaping reward. Many farmers are letting their stock run in the sage brush where the pasture is fine; otherwise they would have to buy hay. The rain has helped the stock water proposition too. Homer and Sam Cates and Elza Niccum are letting their stock water out of pools of rain water where otherwise they would have to use precious stored water.

The other evening Doc Raffington came in with his cows. He noticed that a badger had dug a hole in the bottom of his pond dam. The next evening when he brought the cows in, the dam had washed out and all his stock water was gone.

This makes the third time that dam has washed out. The first time he did not have sufficient spillway. His ditch broke and ran in a big head of water and ran over his dam. Next spring he fixed the break and spillway and filled the pond with waste water and the new dirt did not hold, but washed out again.

Doc is getting a little too old to handle a feno so he got a neighbor to bring over a four horse team and feno and they did a real job of fixing the dam. Last winter it held water all right but now a badger had to come along. "To heck with it," says Doc. "That is getting to be a habit." So he goes and gets a well drill. Now they are drilling him a well.

Arch Eastman has just shingled his ouse. That hall storm we had some time ago sure changed a lot of people's minds as to the value of a paper roof.

Johnnie Hamilton says "I got to re-paper my roof as soon as I can, that hall storm sure made a seive out of it."

Russel Howell traded thirty-five head of feeder pigs for a car.

We Hollowites are not much on bookkeeping. A large bunch of small pigs and no feed. We don't know which side of the ledger they belong on. Assets? Liabilities? At least we can set the car in the corner of the yard and not be bothered with it.
