COW HOLLOW

None of us want to wish our lives away. We are all growing old inevitably too fast. Yet we all have started out on the new year with a hearty interest.

We have discarded the old calendar maybe it was not so good, and now we have a brand new one before us.

It looks like a mystery novel. Anything can happen. We are wondering what the pages will bring as we turn them up. The old year was not so good for us in Cow Hollowites or the new lander under the north canal. No rthe world at large either. Most of us are optimistic. We have faith in this new year. What would the world be without faith. We believe the tide has turned from the war torn world. We do not try to kid ourselves into thinking it is all over but the shouting.

As for us Cow Hollowites we believe we have our new land in shape to produce even more crop in 1941 than it would of in 1940 had the canal not broke. Of course, we are

not expecting any more canal breaks not as bad as the one last time at least. With every one so busy there will be, no doubt, a bigger demand for our crops and at a price that we can live on.

Russell Howell has quite a spot of new land all cleared, plowed and ready to seed it now just as quick as it is dry enough. 'Tis pretty much a proven fact that the early seeding of small grain and alfalfa is the one that produces crops.

The most of the land in Cow Hollow is in crop now. But most every one still has a little corner or a patch that was roughest to put in yet. Most everyone plans to get those pieces in this year.

Sam Cates, Dale Limbaugh, Mort Wixon and Doc Raffington have their places all into crop land now.

All the farms on the north side of the Hollow have considerable rough land and can put in as much of it as they choose. The best of their land is in now but they no doubt will be putting in more from time to time.

Of the people on the south side of the Hollow, Frank Parker has the most to put in yet. He has it all cleared and no doubt will get it all in early this spring.

George Gabriel just east of Frank still has 6 or 8 acres of his roughest land not in yet. Part of it is pretty steep but he can just extend his present corrugates on down over it. He says he is going to seed it and use it for pasture.

Clarence Niccum has about 5 acres that isn't so bad that he will get in this year. And 3 or 5 acres that he will never try to do anything with but run some waste water over it for pasture.

Chet Sage has about 10 acres that he expects his renter to get in this year.

Jim Trummel next in line I guess has all his land in too. He has some draws that he will no doubt clean out and use waste water on for pasture.

The Mendola Sheep company has had two bands of sheep in Cow Hollow for a few days, cleaning up what pasture was left.

Doc Raffington is rather provoked with the sheep idea. He sold his hay and pasture with the understanding that he would drill a well so they could have water for the sheep and feed the hay on his fields. That way he would get the benefit of the manure.

He started the well drill. They struck fine water at 30 ft. "Just as soft as snow," he says "But not enough of it for the sheep." They went on down way past the 200 ft. mark and got an abundance of water. "But so hard," he says "that it would bounce."

"Even his cows wont' drink it. They come down to my pond instead," says Frank Parker.

Friday Doc was scurrying around to get a motor and wiring to hook up the pump for the sheep. The sheep arrived Friday evening and Sunday morning they was seen to pull out again, on down the Hollow. Doc never did get his well hooked up to the power line. Now he has an expensive deep well and very poor water and never got his pasture sold and won't get the manure from his hay. Where he might as well stopped his well at the first water and had a cheap well and good soft water.

Mendola's other band of sheep pastured on Jim Trummel's for 3 or 4 days. They have bought Jim's hay and will maybe feed it up there and water at Sage's well.

Earl Heaton changed his mind about being a barber. Once a man has been a farmer for a while city life don't suit him any more.

Now Earl has bought a farm over by Sweet, Idaho. He was back in Cow Hollow over the week-end getting his furniture and stayed awhile to help Doc Limbaw tear down the house that he lived in.

Dale is tearing down Earl's house and will build part of it onto his own house and make other build-

ing of the rest of it.
Thursday Clarence Niccum was up on the hill getting brush wood. He thought he saw part of Elza's sheep above the canal and more than a mile from home. He wrote a note and sent 9 year old Johnnie running three-quarters of a mile to tell Elza of his sheep and go help him to get them.
