Russel Howell, Frank Parker and Clarence Niccum took in the stock sale at Ontario last week. Stock is selling pretty good now. That two cent raise we have had of late on hogs just means the difference between raising hogs on a profit or a loss.

Fred La Shaunse and Elza Niccum still have around forty-five hogs to put on the market in the next thirty days so Cow Hollow is still in the hog game.

Russel, Frank and Clarence were discussing the sale. Baby calves taken from their mother selling up to six and eight dollars. Russel and Frank are agreed that it is too much money for any week-old calf.

Elza Niccum sent in a jersey baby beef calf. This calf, if it had of been just a week old, would of brought about one dollar and fifty cents. As it was, at just under three months old, it brought \$26.36.

This calf was raised on a heifer that proved to be no good as a milk cow, so he put this little runt of a jersey bull calf on her and

turned her out. The next poorest cow that Elza has is worth twice as much as this cow, as a milk cow.

Now this cow by raising this calf has turned Elza around nine dollars per month, which is about twice as much as the best cow he has, has turned in for him.

The question is: "Was that calf worth a dollar and a half at a week old?"

Sunday Homer's wife received a telegram that her mother was dead, so early Monday morning, Homer and family bid Cow Hollow good bye and headed for "back home."

This is the third of our pioneers to give up the struggle. Pioneering in new land is a tough proposition. Everyone of us can tell of real hardships, but the reward is equal to the struggle and in most cases far more than equal if we will stick to the end.

Mindeola Sheep men are now hauling long hay from Doc Rafingtons. When a Basco hauls hay on a wagon for sheep he figures on hauling three tons to a load; so now as he is hauling twenty miles on a truck he wishes to put on a real load. When you meet him on the road, his load is about as wide as it is long and don't leave much room for you to get by.

As he goes by here he sweeps all the mailboxes out of his way. George Gabriel and Elza Niccum have both put their mail box up twice and Clarence just left his box on the ground for a while.

Elza told the hauler that if he knocked them over again he would have the postal authorities to take it up and see what could be done about it. The F.S.A.'s new sanitary facilities have begun to appear in Cow Hollow. They were promised to us early in the spring. They have been the subject of much discussion and jokes. Now lo and behold. They have begun to appear.

"Tis an ill wind that blows nobody good." All this ice and our ponds make jolly skating for the youngsters. Ice skates are rather scarce in this country as we don't always have ice to skate on.
