When we received this particular order we were very anxious to fill it with as many of our local men as possible as we considered it desirable employment. The job paid \$1.33 1-13 per hour, 40 hours per week and was for two to three months duration. It was received at a period of the year when there is very little employment in this locality. This office referred 34 carpenters on this order. Of this number 33 were employed and 32 are still working. We would have liked to have referred more. We do not know the names of the skilled labor from Cow Hollow referred to in this article, but we do know that if they did not have union affiliations and paid up membership cards in the particular union mentioned that they did not meet the employer's requirements on this particular order, and therefore could not be referred. When we received this order we did not know what the cost was to join the union, and did not find out till we were flooded with questions by non-union carpenters asking us what was necessary to join the union. As it is the duty of this office to inform applicants for positions any information connected with the employment, we contacted the local A. F. of L. Carpenters and Joiners Union at Payette, Idaho and secured the information necessary to relay to the applicants. The order for union workers is not new in this office as it has happened several times on work projects within this county and even within the city limits of Nyssa, when there were qualified non-union men who could have done the work but who did not have the necessary union requirements to qualify under the employer's order.

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
