**Farm Market Bill Outline Given**

For the benefit of farmers and others interested, the following summary of the proposed agricultural marketing bill (House Bill 162) now before the State Legislature has been prepared by C. H. Coad, Nyssa attorney, for the Nyssa Journal readers.

The proposed act would provide for each product of farms a committee of five individuals, consisting of 3 producers of the crop (farmers) and 2 commercial processors of the crop, which committee would have authority to establish grades and standards higher than present grades and standards if they desired, and this committee would be responsible for market promotion and development for the particular product.

To finance this work a levy by the committee not to exceed 2 per cent of the value of the product, as determined by the sale between the producer and the commercial processor, could be made each year. This fund would be held for the use of the committee controlling the product upon which the levy was made, and would be restricted to use of at least 75 per cent thereof to market promotion, advertising and grade standardization. Not more than 25 per cent could be used for administering expenses.

The procedure for establishing such committee for any product is by position and election of all commercial growers of the product in the state. It would require vote of 60 per cent of growers and of growers representing 60 per cent of the total tonnage of the particular crop produced in the preceding crop year to establish such control. In this election the producers would vote for 9 individuals, and from the 9 receiving the highest number of votes, the governor of the state would elect the committee members—3. The governor also would name 2 commercial processors to the committee to fill the required membership of 5. This committee of 5 would have control of the funds and exercise all of the authority given under the act.

No salaries are provided, but the committee members receive \$5 per day for the time spent on the business of the committee, together with their actual expenses. One director would be elected each year.

After 5 years operation, if the producers desire to terminate the control, that may be done by petition and election. 50 per cent tonnage produced, represented in voting, would terminate the control, if they desired.

The control of the committee would not extend to casual sales of farmers or to products used on the farm.

The intent of the act is to provide grower control over the standard and grade of the particular crops, and to establish markets for such crops through advertising, and maintenance of high quality of products marketed. Provision is made for special brand for top quality products under such control which it is expected will create a demand for them.

Farmers interested in obtaining this legislation should write to the "Agriculture Committee, House of Representatives, Salem, Oregon" or to V. B. Staples, State Representative, in Salem.
