Sam and Homer Cates have sure been kicking up the wet dirt up there. They have about all their ground, that is not seeded down, ready to drill to grain now. Sam is a stout advocate of corn. He is going to plow up part of his hay this year to raise corn. He still has his last years hay on his hands. He says, "I don't have to hunt a buyer for corn and I don't like to hunt corn to buy." He also believes in corn and hogs.

We all are guessing about the Noah Howard place. It is the "sore eye" of Cow Hollow. It is the only farm in the Hollow that has never had even an acre farmed on it yet. It has been contested once and all kinds of propaganda put out about it. Last year it was all cleared, leveled and ready to seed but not seeded. Last fall the Howards moved off. Went to Boise. We all supposed that was the last of them but this spring they get up there once in a while. Have burned a few weeds so it looks like they haven't given it up yet.

Everything out here is sure greening up now. Spring is upon us. The old hens are clucking and squalling.

government is applying priorities. Little by little priorities are being extended to various metals and commodities; manufacturers of consumer goods will be limited in their supplies. The first article on the priority list is aluminum and manufacturers of aluminum goods will be out of business unless they can buy scrap aluminum from airplane factories at 11 cents a pound, the price fixed by the government. Priorities is one way of dealing with the condition. Another is a plan, not yet approved, to pay workers a certain percentage of their wage in government securities having a distant maturity.
