There are 8,000 construction men and 15,000 trainees. I don't know how many officers. In this sleepy town you can imagine what the housing situation is. Only by a stroke of supreme luck does one get even a room. We had the stroke, paying 2.50 per night for a room.

FACTS ABOUT POPPY DAY

Origin of Poppy Day.

The custom of wearing poppies in memory of the World War dead sprang up spontaneously in many parts of the world soon after the close of the war, inspired by the poem, "In Flanders Fields", by Colonel John McCrae. First wearing of the poppies in America took place in New York City two days before the signing of the Armistice. The poppy was adopted as the memorial flower of the American Legion in 1920, and similar action was taken at the American Legion Auxiliary's first national convention in 1921.

Extent of Poppy Day

Poppy Day is generally observed throughout the United States on the Saturday before Memorial Day. Throughout the British Empire poppies are worn on Armistice Day, November 11.

Who Makes The Poppies?

The American Legion and Auxiliary poppies are made by disabled war veterans in government hospitals and in convalescent workrooms maintained by the Auxiliary. Many hundreds of veterans, unable to do other work, are given employment during winter and spring months, their annual earnings exceeding \$100,000. This year poppies were made in 81 hospitals and 41 workrooms, with approximately 12,000,000 of the flowers being produced.

Who Distributes the Poppies?

Memorial Poppies are distributed by volunteer workers from the American Legion Auxiliary. Junior members of the Auxiliary, daughters of veterans under 18 years of age, take an active part in the work.

POPPIES AID
NEEDY CHILDREN

How the "little red poppies," worn in honor of the World War dead on Poppy Day, help care for needy children of war veterans throughout the year was explained today by Mrs. Douglas McDonald, child welfare chairman of Nyssa Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary, as the Unit continued preparations for the observance of Poppy Day, Saturday, May 24.

"Every poppy that is worn means more help for the children who have been left without a father's support because of the last war," she said. "First, there are the children of the men who make the poppies, the disabled veterans in the government hospitals and those employed in the Auxiliary's poppy work rooms. These children benefit from the earnings of their fathers, the poppy money helping keep their homes together until the father can once more take regular employment.

"Food, clothing, shelter, school expenses and medical care are some of the things which the poppy means to unfortunate children of veterans. We think it highly fitting that the flower which honors those who have died for America should help those who will build the America of the future. We hope that everyone will remember these children when they secure their poppies on Poppy Day and contribute as generously as possible to the Auxiliary's welfare fund."

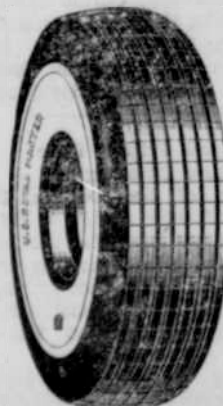

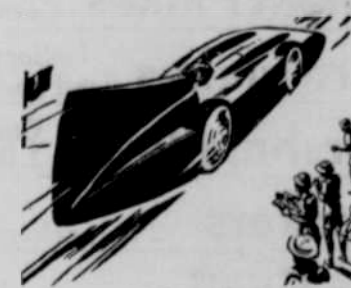
