Entry Regulations

2. Arrangements complete with accessories such as mats, figures, bowls, frogs, and, if possible, a card table may be brought Wednesday morning by 10:00 A. M.

3. If impossible to meet regulations 1 and 2, flowers may be brought at the time of the meeting.

4. All bowls, vases, card tables and other accessories should be labeled for identification.

5. Card giving name of contributor and creator of arrangement should accompany each display.

6. Flowers cut in the evening and placed in deep water over night will be more likely to remain in good condition.

7. The display is to remain through Thursday, in order to be viewed by additional groups.

8. Flowers and containers should be removed Thursday afternoon between 4:00 and 5:00 P. M. The Civic Club cannot be responsible for them after that time.

MAY ORGANIZE SEED GROWERS

Organization of an "Oregon Seed Growers league" will be undertaken at a statewide meeting called at Oregon State college Saturday, May 24. The State meeting is the outgrowth of two preliminary meetings of representative seed growers who are seeking to create an organization which will provide a voice for the Oregon seed industry such as the Eastern Oregon Wheat league, the Oregon Dairymen's association, and other such commodity groups provided for farmers engaged in those enterprises.

Anyone engaged or interested in the production of seed in the state is invited to attend the Corvallis meeting, according to Glenn Ritchey of Forest Grove, who has been serving as temporary chairman of an organization committee. Other members consist of A. T. Jernstedt, Carlton; J. H. Harland, Rickreall; Raymond Johnson, Eugene; Henry orn, Aurora, and Gerald Workinger, Sheed.

The purpose of the organization as outlined by the committee will be to promote the production of seeds for which Oregon is adapted and provide a medium for joint effort in handling production and harvesting problems, standardization of grades and brands, cooperation with other agencies, and support of state or national legislation that may be needed from time to time.
