mumps. George Cleaver and Alva Doodell had their beets thinned the past week.

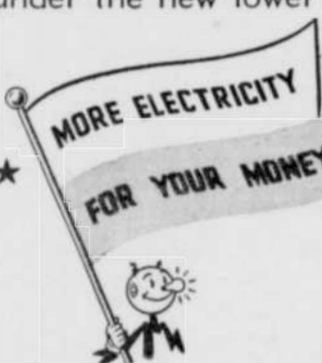
