NURSES NEEDED FOR THE GOVERNMENT

As a part of the National Defense Program, the Government months ago began preparation to meet an anticipated need for an unusually large number of nurses, both in its military and civil services. The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open continuous examinations to secure nurses, but despite these examinations, there is a continuing shortage of nurses for the civil service positions.

Two examinations are now open for receipt of applications. One—Announcement No. 38—under the title of PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE, \$2,000 a year, and GRADUATE NURSE, \$1,800 a year (for general staff duty), is open for the U. S. Public Health Service and the Indian Service, including Alaska. This is an "unasssembled" examination. Applicants are not given a written test but are rated on their professional training and experience as shown in their applications and by other evidence. The other—Announcement No. 100—under the title of JUNIOR GRADUATE NURSE, \$1,620 a year, is for the U. S. Public Health Service, the Indian Service and the Veteran's Administration.

The need for nurses is immediate. Apply now for further information at the office of the Secretary, Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners at any first or second-class post office, or write to the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

SAFETY RULES

Children:

1. Play only in vacant lots or designated playgrounds, never play in the streets.
2. Don't step out into the street from between parked cars.
3. When walking along the highway, always walk on the left, facing approaching traffic. When cars approach, step off the paved surface till they pass.

Bicyclists:

1. Never ride two or more abreast, always ride single file.
2. Ride on the right side of the street or road.
3. When turning, make proper arm signals and be sure no cars are near.
4. Observe all traffic signals and signs.
5. Don't make sudden turns across the path of traffic.
6. Don't ride double.
7. Keep your bicycle in good mechanical condition.
8. Park your bikes at bicycle racks whenever possible.
9. For night riding, be sure you have a good front light, an efficient rear reflector and wear something white, such as a white sweater or cap.
10. Know and observe the rules pertaining to bicycle operation in your own community.

AIR CORPS NEEDS MORE PROCUREMENT INSPECTORS

No small part of the work of securing faster, more powerful, and safer airplanes and equipment is the inspection of aircraft materials. Parachutes, goggles, camera lenses, instruments, and all other equipment must be inspected by competent well-trained men.

Through an examination announced some time ago, the Civil Service Commission has been seeking experienced men for procurement inspector positions in the Air Corps of the War Department. The Commission has not been able to obtain enough men for these positions. On the contrary, the needs have been extended to other fields than those in the original announcement. Five new fields in which persons may qualify have been added and the options now are: Aircraft, engines.

British civilians. Dried beans are being snapped up for the army and overseas.

Under parity payments approved

instruments, parachutes, aircraft propellers, tools and gages, radio, aircraft miscellaneous materials, textiles, fur-lined clothing and optical.

In general, mechanical experience, which may include apprenticeship, is required in the field applied for. For only four options (aircraft, parachutes, propellers, and aircraft materials) need this experience be specifically on aircraft materials. College courses in engineering may be substituted for part of the experience. Applicants will not have to take a written test, but will be rated on their experience and education. For details concerning the amended requirements applicants should consult Announcement No. 6-249 Revised of April 22, 1941.

Original appointments will be made at salaries ranging from \$1,620 to \$2,600 a year. Opportunities for advancement are excellent. Applications may be filed until further notice with the Secretary of the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners at Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio. Qualified persons are urged to apply for details to the Secretary at Wright Field; to any first or second-class post office; to the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.; or to any of the Commission's District offices.

y the president Canadians can pay our cents a bushel and dump their wheat on the American market. To prevent this destruction of the home market the president by proclamation, has limited the amount of wheat importations. Canada can ship in 785,000 bushels, or all but 5,000 of the total amount. With parity payments of 85 cents, and other payments, the wheat price is around 97 cents.

One of the troubles of farmers is labor. Available labor has been drafted or gone to the cities to work in plants with government orders. The Selective service has ordered local boards to be careful about drafting farm help, but nothing can be done about labor going to the cities where wages are higher.

While the Army is reaching out to pilot material, the NYA is opening up vocational training schools in every state, in every large city, on their experience and education. The first principals of shipbuilding, airplane making, iron work, the government is spending \$150,000 to train men to work on ships, in airplane factories, in plants with aircraft for tractors, tanks and anti-aircraft guns, and to build up reservoir of mechanics for the round crews needed at all airports, of which a half dozen are already established in Oregon and Washington, with more to follow. It is being proposed that CCO and NYA be merged, as they are competing with each other for the same group of men. Abolition of the CCC, however, not favored in the northwest.
