NOXIOUS WEED TALK AT HOLLOW GRANGE

R. M. McKennon County Agent was present at the Cow Hollow Grange meeting Tuesday night at the Cow Hollow Club House for the purpose of discussing noxious weed control over Malheur county. There were twenty varieties of weeds on display with a guessing contest in which Elza Niccum won first by guessing 17 correctly and Mrs. Cooper and Mrs. Hunter tied with 14 each.

Mr. McKennon explained that weeds as judged in three general classes: Annuals, bi-annuals and Perennials. Annuals do not come the second year from roots, therefore preventing spreading from roots. They are easy to control by the fact that eradicating the weed before it blooms stops the spreading.

A new annual that has spread considerably this year is the salsify, a weed with several tall stems with a large yellow blossom resembling dandelion. It spreads very fast but it is easy to kill.

The bi-annual is harder to kill, as its roots live two years. Plants may be cut back for the two year period thus preventing blooming. The roots do not spread but continue to grow for the entire time and spread from the seed.

Bull thistle, often confused with Canada thistle, is a bi-annual and a very dangerous weed which will soon crowd out the pasture grasses. It can be killed out if kept cut back so that leaves cannot feed the roots which soon die if cultivated.

Perennials are the most dangerous of all with their spreading roots which are easily recognized with divided roots, sending out prongs in every direction. There are four kinds of these perennials in Malheur County, the most dangerous being the white top, which is causing the abandonment of some farms. There

are three kinds of White Top and Mr. Kennon urges that farmers study them and cooperate with him in helping to eradicate it.

Canada thistle is also a perennial which is hard to get rid of. But can be killed by cultivating with 2 years of summer fallow, as can the other three, but if allowed to bloom once in the two years, a year of work is lost as it spreads so rapidly.

Morning Glory is a third with fourteen varieties. Sheepmen claim that it is a better sheep pasture than mountain grass and would like to see it all over the mountains, but the farmer whose land becomes infested with it had better look out. It spreads very fast and will soon take the crop as well as spreading to the nearby farms.

Russian Nap Weed is a fourth, commonly known as Black Root but not so prevalent as others.

Mr. McKennon advised the use of chemicals as the one sure way to rid the farm of weeds, but it is so expensive that it is best adapted to small areas, since the cost is \$175 per acre and should be done as soon as weeds are found, to save expense. Carbon bisulphide is the best treatment and will be applied by the county if farmers will pay the cost of materials used.

Chlorate spray and Salt solutions are sometimes used but are not as quick to act as carbon bisulphate. There is a weed eradication law but, owing to the small amount of money allowed for the program it does not cover the cost of enforcement.

Mr. McKennon explained that the County is gradually and continuously fighting small areas where weeds are most prevalent and, so far, have cleaned 20,000 acres with the \$3,000 per year allotted for the purpose, which is a small amount, compared with the \$37,000 per year in some places.

According to these facts noxious weeds can be cleaned out, and will be, if the farmers will cooperate with the county but will require cooperation of the farmers themselves as well.

FARMERS CO-OP SHOWS SINCE FOUNDING IN 1936

The steady growth of the Farmers Supply Co-operative, organized in 1936, was shown in figures released this week by H. C. Gregory, recently employed by the board of directors, as manager of the co-operative.

Starting with an original capital of \$618, invested by interested farmers, the co-operative now boasts of resources totalling over \$30,000. Recently the co-operative has started construction of two new buildings, one in Nyssa and another in Ontario. Both of these buildings will house a service station and store-room.

James Flaherty is in charge of the Nyssa station and store and Ray McIntyre is in charge at Ontario. Both plants are now in operation, according to Gregory. Another station is operated at Cairo Junction. The board of directors of the association are I. J. Bjugan, E. C. Crocker, Alva Amidon, George Ward and Marion Chard.

The annual meeting of the association will be held in July, with the definite date to be set soon.

PRUYN'S BOAT ENTERED IN McCALL REGATTA

Washington Snapshots

Washington is beginning to worry, but isn't doing much more, about the hundreds and perhaps thousands of small and large plants which may be forced to shut down because of shortages in materials caused by the defense drain.

Such shut downs of course, would leave many jobless even if the workers could transfer to defense production. Transactions always lag, and in many cases employees are not trained or equipped to do the kind of work required in a defense plant.

The situation is pressing, and threatens to become more so. There is a present shortage in the case of many metals because defense production alone takes huge chunks of the metal available.

Scores of factory managers have anticipated such a situation. They have turned to substitutes for materials which are scarce. But the direction in which they can turn is being drastically limited.

A short while ago, many users of lighter metals like aluminum arranged to use plastics instead. But now, because there is a shortage of fabricators and molders in the plastics industry, plastics are becoming hard to get.

Many of the larger factories have research staffs, and well-trained industrial engineers, and other experts who can help in finding the way out of their "materials" difficulties. But the smaller plants have no such facilities, and they are unable to get the necessary help and suggestions from Washington.

Even the bigger factories have trouble. There is the case of the man from a Midwestern city who himself worked in a Washington defense agency where he became completely familiar with what is needed for defense and how it is bought.

After serving more than six months, he went back to his own business. He realized the product his company manufactured wasn't essential during the present emergency, so for the sake of his company and his employees he should produce something that was.

He had his three best salesmen contact three-score regional purchasing offices for the Army and Navy. He spent days in Washington talking with former associates in defense agencies. He ended with just exactly no defense business.
