Mrs. Clarence Brotzman accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Paul Nickens to Oklahoma where she will visit relatives.

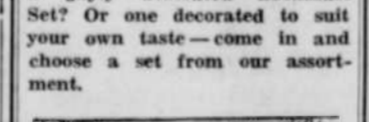
