Notice hereby is given that an election of the City of Nyssa, Malheur County, Oregon, will be held at the City Hall in the City of Nyssa, Oregon, on the 18th day of August 1941, between the hours of 8 o'clock A. M. and 8 o'clock P. M., to submit to the legal voters of the City of Nyssa, the question of issuing bonds of the City of Nyssa in the maximum amount of \$18,000.00 for the purpose of improving the water works and distributing system, including the laying of new mains between the present water stand and Main Street and along Main Street between First Street and the Grade School Grounds; by the construction of an additional well and a suitable house over Well No. 2; also to acquire and alter a building for storage of water system equipment, to be payable from revenues from said water works system, and, in the event of a deficiency in such revenues, from taxes.

The vote will be by ballots, upon which shall be the words "BONDS YES" and "BONDS NO" and the voter shall place a cross (X) between the word "BONDS" and the word "YES" or between the word "BONDS" and the word "NO" which indicates his choice.

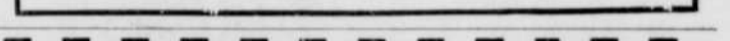
