Famous World's Fair Show To Be Here Fri. Aug. 29



Levi Strauss Puppet Rodeo brought to town through efforts of local Merchant

Levi's Electric Puppet Rodeo, enjoyed by millions of visitors to the 1939 and 1940 Golden Gate International Exposition, will perform here all day Friday, August 29, according to the Golden Rule Store, who was instrumental in bringing this spectacle to town.

The exhibit, credited with being the most complex mechanical and sound display ever built, is traveling aboard its monster, streamlined truck. The show is a complete Western Rodeo, and even a clown and his trickmule.

Each of the 29 puppets is an exact hand carved likeness of prominent figure in the rodeo world; and all are dressed realistically in miniature Levi Strauss Rodeo Shirts and miniature Levi's Waist Overalls, complete even to the concealed copper rivets in the back pockets.

Among the notables represented are Gene Autry, leading singing cowboy star of the movies and radio, Abe Lefton, famous rodeo announcer, Fred McCarag, secretary to the Rodeo Association of America Homer Holcome noted rodeo clown and Burel Mulkey, former Grand Champion Cowboy.

The rodeo carries its own power plant to operate the twelve electric motors and series of electro magnets that actuate its tens of thousands of moving parts. From behind the scenes, it has the complexity of one of Rube Goldberg's mechanical nightmares. Yet, so perfectly has the mechanism been designed that it works automatically throughout, without the necessity of any attendant to pull a wire or so much as throw a switch. The entire action of the rodeo are directed by the electric brain of a concealed Robophone. So exact is the coordination of sound and movement that when any performer speaks, his mouth moves in time with the words he is uttering.

The spectacle, in which Levi Strauss & Company have already invested some \$50,000, is traveling in charge of Leonard W. Mitchell, who helped to design and build much of its ingenious mechanism. Mrs. Mitchell is accompanying him on the rodeo's scheduled 25,000 mile tour of the West.

Now Adolph is ready to cut his third cutting and Chuck Share and Dale Limbaugh both have their second cutting to cut yet.

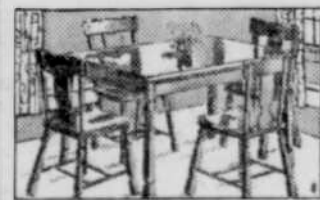
The watermelon season is getting under way again, and Sam Cates and Russell Howell has a good representation from Cow Hollow for the local market.
