Mr. and Mrs. Pete Tensen were business visitors in Vale Monday. Jacob Van Twists threshed their wheat during the past week.

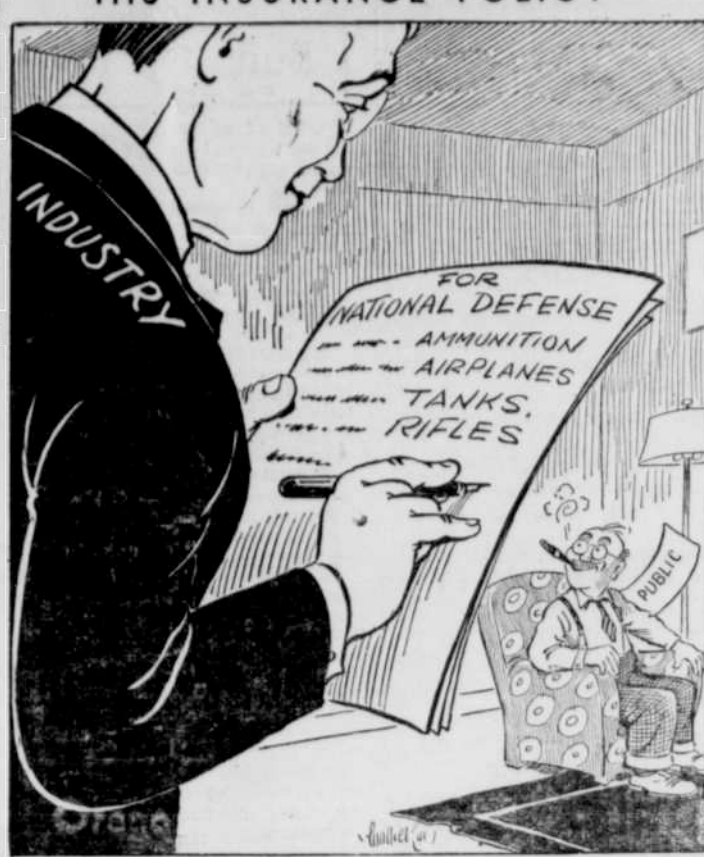

Payette in a tough battle and had done so well against Weiser the week before, was held to a standstill by the plucky Adrian team.

An intercepted pass on Nyssa's 30-yard line in the third quarter provided the game's only score. Nelson of Adrian appeared where the Nyssa receiver might have been, and he galloped all the way down the field with the ball to score. A pass completed on the point try accounted for the conversion.

Injuries have been hard on the Bulldogs. Eugene Cleaver and Bob Browne, both top notch backs, could do no more than watch the Adrian game from the sidelines — doctor's orders. Roy Pierce, first string center, limped into the game and limped out. Eugene Brady, in the line, was suffering from a mangled finger. Even Rex Shelley, hard-plunging tailback, had to spend a long time on the bench because of a "Charlie-horse" in his leg.

But on the Adrian side of the field even the coach was injured. George Simk, Antelope mentor, carried his arm in a sling and his back was in a brace because of a serious accident.

In desperation the Nyssa squad played its heart out during the final quarter, launched a passing attack that carried them to the Adrian 20, missed two passes that would have netted touchdowns had it been possible to catch them and the gun ended the game.

Meanwhile Fruitland dumped its toughest league competition, Weiser, 14 to 6, to top the league. Emmett's Huskies ran over the Payette Pirates, who have been kicked around all season, and Ontario tripped Vale to keep themselves in the running for the title.

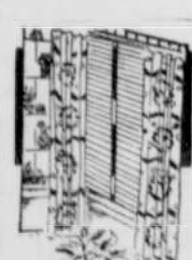
