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Government Reports

The Navy announced the destroyer Kearney was torpedoed while on patrol duty near Iceland. The boat was able to proceed under its own power. The president told his press conference the vessel was clearly within American defensive waters when attacked. Eleven men are reported missing, 10 injured.

ARMING OF SHIPS

The House passed a bill modifying the Neutrality Act to permit the arming of merchant ships. Navy Secretary Knox told his press conference the Navy is ready to put guns aboard American merchant ships as soon as Congress authorizes the action. He said there are sufficient guns for all merchantmen although not all can be used against both airplanes and submarines. He said arming merchant ships will slow down submarines and impair their marksmanship because they will have to stay below the surface and use their limited supply of torpedoes instead of attacking with shellfire.

LEND-LEASE AID

Navy Secretary Knox announced two overage submarines are being transferred to Britain under the lend-lease program. The president announced lend-lease transfers during September reached a record \$155,000,000 in equipment and services—about three times the monthly average of the past six months. The president said aid is going to Britain, China, South America and the refugee Polish and Norwegian governments. Russia, he said, is paying in gold and strategic materials for supplies sent to that country. The president reported only five percent of the original \$7,000,000,000 for lend-lease remains unused. WHAT PRICE SECURITY?

Editor's note: The following is a letter on a subject that if put into effect will affect practically every citizen of the United States. It is written to us by one of our readers and reflects the opinion of the writer. His opinion and figures and facts as stated are his own and do not necessarily reflect the editorial policy of the Nyssa Journal.

The president has recently announced the intention of the administration to vastly increase the number of people covered by social security payments and also an intention to up the present rate of 5% of the payroll to 9%, an increase of nearly 100%.

All of this is to be done for the announced purpose of preventing inflation by the government taking a larger slice of the earnings of employer firm, an oil-well supplies manufacturer and a railroad car builder none of whose employees had prior cannon producing experience. The navy reported as an example of its subcontracting policy that 75 small shops in New York state are working on parts for naval gun mounts.

PRIORITY EMPLOYMENT
The Federal Security agency asked all employees who anticipate layoffs due to shortages to report their problems at once to the nearest State Employment office—the first step in obtaining government action to give plants defense orders. The agency said state employment officials have already surveyed 200 plants threatened with shortages and made reports which may result in placing of defense orders to prevent unemployment.

AGRICULTURE
The Agriculture department reported the farm labor supply at 64 per cent of normal and 25 per cent below last year, and said farmers have been able to keep their hired men from taking industrial jobs only by sharply increasing wage rates. The Agriculture department announced national prospects for all crops improved about two per cent during September, indicating one of the largest total farm yields on record. The department said farmers do not need priority orders to purchase farm machinery except special classes, because ratings are assigned to manufacturers and warehousemen who supply farmers.

PRICES
The Bureau of Labor Statistics index of 900 wholesale prices remained unchanged during the week ended October 11 although in the past year average wholesale prices have risen 17.3 per cent and are the highest since early 1930. Price Administrator Henderson notified tire manufacturers he "would not object" to advances in consumer list prices on tires and tubes to not more than nine per cent above June 16 levels. He also announced an investigation of crude oil prices because of suggested price increases.

PRIORITIES
Priorities Director Donald Nelson extended priority assistance to virtually all industrial plants needing maintenance and repair parts. The order was in line with SPAB policy of keeping all industrial machines in good running order. Mr. Nelson suspended until March 31, 1942, the aluminum operations of the Central Pattern and Foundry Co., Chicago, because it allegedly diverted aluminum to non-defense uses such as the manufacture of slot machines. Mr. Nelson also imposed rigid controls on certain chemicals, including some used for dry cleaning.

SHIPS AND OIL
The Maritime Commission awarded contracts for construction of 49 tankers which it said will be part of the largest and most modern tanker fleet in the world. Including those building or ordered by the commission and private interests, 208 new tankers of 2,196,300 gross tons will be finished by the end of 1943, bringing the total available to 568. The commission reported the launching this week of two more if these tankers and also adopted a program calling for construction of 15 reinforced concrete barges suitable for carrying oil.

PAN-AMERICAN RELATIONS
Secretary of State Hull issued a statement "that the U. S. has had no connection, direct or indirect, with the recent Government changes in Panama. The U. S. and Argentina signed their first trade treaty since 1853. The army seized 18 planes bound for Peru from Canada because of the "increasing critical situation . . . (and) needs of national defense."

ARMY
War Secretary Stimson announced the army has adopted a new semi-automatic carbine to replace the present 45 calibre pistol. The new weapon will allow 33 per cent additional firepower. Mr. Stimson also announced 2,000 junior officers of the National Guard will be transferred to the Air Force for ground duty to free flying officers for air duty. The army announced formation of four new Coast Artillery Barrage Balloon Battalions, each with 1,257 men.

employee and employers alike. Really behind the whole scheme is the Social Security board reaching out for more power and more money, which is running true to form, while hiding behind the front of preventing inflation and promoting social uplift. Quite an uplift for the boys and girls on the bureau payroll.

This proposal would increase the present loan coverage of about 40,000,000 workers, another 27,000,000. This increase is estimated to be 11,500,000 farmers and farm laborers, 4,000,000 government workers, 3,000,000 day laborers, 2,500,000 servants and 6,000,000 miscellaneous workers.

The farmers will bitterly oppose their inclusion in the tax, and the employment of other classes of work except government employees, have always been of such a temporary and elusive nature that it was considered impossible of effective or economical administration.

As you know, the social security funds are converted directly into the general fund of the treasury and used to meet general appropriations. This makes it necessary to levy additional general income and excise taxes to meet later social security appropriations.

This proposal would, on account of increased numbers brought under the law and proposed increased rates, increase the present cash take of two billion dollars to five billion dollars annually. A sum of terrific magnitude to pour into the general funds of the treasury and, after it is spent, raise the money again to pay the increased obligation of the fund.

This proposal includes taking over home relief from the states which I think we will all oppose. State relief administration is much more effective, fair and economical than Federal administration and a larger per cent of the tax dollar reaches the relief client who is worthy of help. County administration is even better than state according to past experience.

Up to date under the present Social Security Act, 5% of the \$2,740,602,058 collected for old-age benefits has been paid out in benefits. The balance unpaid is an overhauling obligation of the taxpayer as the treasury has already spent the unpaid balance to the credit of the old age fund.

The unemployment fund has collected \$4,245,246,801 and 42% of this amount has been paid out in benefits. One-tenth of this latter tax has gone into the Federal Treasury and the balance remains in the treasuries of the various states. Oregon now has a balance of over \$12,000,000 in the unemployment fund. These are the funds the federal social security now seeks to convert into the general treasury fund to spend for general purposes.

The proposed amendment to the Social Security law provides disability benefits and medical treatment for people on relief. God alone knows how much waste this means and it also means building another big medical bureau. For sheer waste this beats them all.

For further details on this matter we refer you to October 13, 1941, issue of Time magazine.

Careful investigation of these proposed security law changes should convince everyone that a device to bring \$5,000,000,000 a year into the general fund of the U. S. Treasury for indiscriminate spending, with a consequent obligation to again collect the money to pay it out, would be a blow which this country cannot stand. If the money has to be raised, get it by a manufacturer's sales tax and avoid a future obligation which the economy of this country cannot meet.
