The magic of modern dairy industry makes it possible to shrink five quarts of fluid milk into one quart of dried milk. Add water and dried milk powder becomes fluid again. Dried milk is in great demand for export to friendly nations abroad. It takes little space in the holds of ships, stays sweet without refrigeration, and can be used as a substitute for fresh milk for children. The U. S. Department of Agriculture has placed dried milk high on the list of "defense foods" whose increased production is sought during 1941 and '42.

#### FOR DEFENSE DRIVE

Increased milk production is the contribution being made to the national food for defense program by 600 Malheur county farmers cooperating in the department of agriculture's farm security program. Howard Bertsch, Farm Security administration area supervisor, Miles Building, Ontario, announces. Additional milk is being produced to provide milk for dairy products which can be shipped to Great Britain under terms of the lend-lease bill.

"Dairymen working with FSA are increasing milk production through better feeding practices and by giving their cows better care. Addition of grain, as recommended by the extension service, to the daily rations of milk producing animals, good drinking water, proper shelter, both from heat and cold, as means of increasing dairy production are being stressed, Bertsch reports. Improvement of dairy herds through cooperative purebred sire services is playing an important part in boosting production, says Bertsch. Joint use and joint ownership of purebred sires gives many small dairymen access to better breeding stock and eventually better herds. Dairymen find it profitable to add to their herds by holding over heifers from good stock.

Bertsch suggests that farmers interested in bull rings, contact either the extension service or the Farm Security office located in the Miles building.
