STATE CAPITAL NEWS

SALEM, ORE., Nov. 6—Demand for a special session of the legislature appears to be confined to a few political demagogues in Portland. Certainly there is no special session sentiment to be found around the state house and all comment coming from up-state senators and representatives has been opposed to the move.

Dean Walker, senate president from Polk county, has expressed opposition to a special session unless and until a definite program has been worked out for its consideration and Robert Farrell, Jr., speaker of the house who has been repeatedly quoted in the Portland press as urging the session, told capitol newsmen this week that he was only lukewarm toward the proposal.

Governor Sprague has refused to comment on the proposal except to admit that he is being urged to convene the lawmakers. The governor's political advisers, however, have let it be known that he does not favor the session. Among the reasons the governor is disinclined to call the lawmakers into session is the fact that no one appears to know just what good could be accomplished thereby. While the Portland agitators for the session are clamoring for relief for the small home owners and for the small income tax payer, those who are most active in support of the session have not yet suggested how this relief is to be provided.

Neither does any one around the capitol have any well developed ideas on this subject. Until some such program is developed, it is pointed out, it would be futile to convene the legislators and expect anything to be accomplished in the 20 days allotted to a special session.

Attention is also called to the fact that an interim committee created by the last legislature is now at work on a study of the state's assessment and tax laws. This committee is composed of a number of tax experts as well as veteran members of the legislature. Unless this committee can agree on a definite program of tax reform it is felt that it would be hopeless to expect the 90 members of the legislature to get together starting from scratch and with no definite goal to shoot at.

Furthermore state officials are not inclined to view the situation growing out of the assessment controversy in Multnomah county or the prospective surplus in the income tax fund as emergencies which can not await the next regular session for attention by the lawmakers.

The cash balance in the state treasury at the beginning of the current fiscal year, July 1, was \$3,500,000 greater than at the beginning of the previous fiscal year, according to a report by State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott—\$15,111,470 as compared to \$11,592,821. Receipts of the treasury department for the fiscal year just ended totaled \$86,715,367.59 against disbursements of \$83,196,518. Scott's report shows. Largest single source of revenue was the gasoline tax which poured \$13,741,906.13 into the state's coffers during the year. Next largest was the state's liquor monopoly with liquor sales and licenses bringing in a total of \$12,179,070.28. Other major sources of state revenue included:

Income and excise taxes, \$7,100,000; inheritance and gift taxes, \$693,283.81; employer contributions to unemployment compensation trust fund, \$7,150,652.38; contributions to industrial accident fund, \$5,327,864.32; motor vehicle registration and license fees, \$3,630,114.86; motor carrier account (trucks and busses) \$1,560,970.50; World War veterans' state aid commission, repayment of loans and sale of property, \$2,581,355.36; federal contributions for public assistance, \$3,128,309.15; federal aid for highways, \$2,691,371.11; insurance department fees, \$839,877; corporation department fees, \$322,277; game commission from licenses, fees and fines, \$800,835.

Beekman Essay Title Selected

Portland, Nov. 6 (Special) — The Oregon Historical society has selected "The Old Oregon Country" as the subject for the 1942 C. C. Beekman essay contest.

The prizes offered are as follows: First, \$60; second, \$50; third, \$40 and fourth, \$30. They will be awarded for the best four original essays on the announced subject and written and submitted by girls and boys over 15 years of age and under 18 years of age, attending any public or private school, academy, seminary, college, university or other educational institution within the state of Oregon. Each of the four prize winners will also receive a handsome bronze medal.

The conditions governing the competition are as follows:

1. The essay submitted in competition must not exceed 2,000 words in length.

2. The essay may be in handwriting or in typewritten form, preferably upon paper of commercial letter size, either ruled or unruled, the several sheets being numbered consecutively and written on one side only, with blank space of about one and one-quarter inches at top and left-hand margin.

3. The essay shall be accompanied by a separate sheet containing

the name and post office address of the writer, the date of his or her birth, and the name of the school attended.

4. There shall also be delivered with the essay a certificate signed by the principal or a teacher of the educational institution attended, stating that the writer of this essay is a student attending the same.

5. In order to be considered in competition the essay must be submitted, by mail or in person, to the Oregon Historical society, public auditorium, 235 S.W. Market street, Portland, Oregon, not later than Monday, March 16, 1942.

6. All essays submitted in competition will be numbered and submitted, without the names of the writers or other identifying marks, to three judges selected by the committee.

7. All competitive essays will be judged according to their general merit and excellence; but the judges will also take into consideration, in passing thereon, neatness of manuscript, accurate orthography, correct grammar and composition, and purity and clarity of diction.
