NEW CLAIMS FOR BENEFITS TAKEN

Salem, Dec. 25 (Special) — State employment employees in 23 states started Monday accepting new claims for unemployment insurance for the 1942 benefit year. Administrator Silas Gaiser has announced. To be eligible for benefits, workers must serve two waiting weeks after having earned \$200 in covered

employment during the base year that ended September 30, 1941.

First benefits for the new year may be drawn for the week ending January 10, 1942, if unemployment continues uninterrupted into the new benefit year. Those drawing 1941 benefits during the week ending January 3, 1942 may start drawing 1942 benefits without serving waiting weeks if they also are out of work during the first week of the new benefit year and are otherwise eligible.

A year ago 27,676 claims were taken before February 1. Up to December 6, the commission received 58,251 claims, of which 49,450 were found valid. Of these 12,982 claimants have drawn their maximum benefits totalling \$1,264,521, while all payments have reached \$2,348,810.

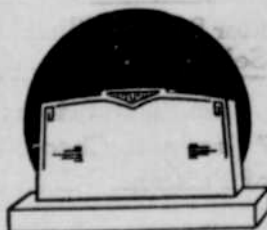
