ENGINEERS MAY SECURE ENSIGN COMMISSION

Class of 1941 graduates in civil, mechanical, electrical or architectural engineering may apply for commissions as ensigns in the civil engineering corps of the navy reserve, the thirteenth naval district has announced.

Formerly, engineering graduates were required to have a minimum of three years active engineering practice following college or university before becoming eligible for a navy commission. Graduates with A. B. or B. S. degrees in architecture are not considered.

TUGS WILL BE NAMED AFTER INDIAN TRIBES

SEATTLE, Jan. 15, (Special)—Four U. S. navy fleet tugs under construction at the Commercial Iron Works plant, Portland, will be named after American Indian tribes the secretary of the navy announced.

The vessels will be christened the U. S. S. Tawasa, U. S. S. Tekasta, U. S. S. Yuma and U. S. S. Zuni. Navy policy for some time has provided for naming of tugs after Indian tribes.

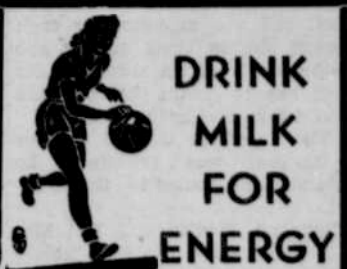
