Several of the parents from the Kolony attended open house at the high school in Adrian Thursday. The local P. T. A. served coffee, tea and cookies.

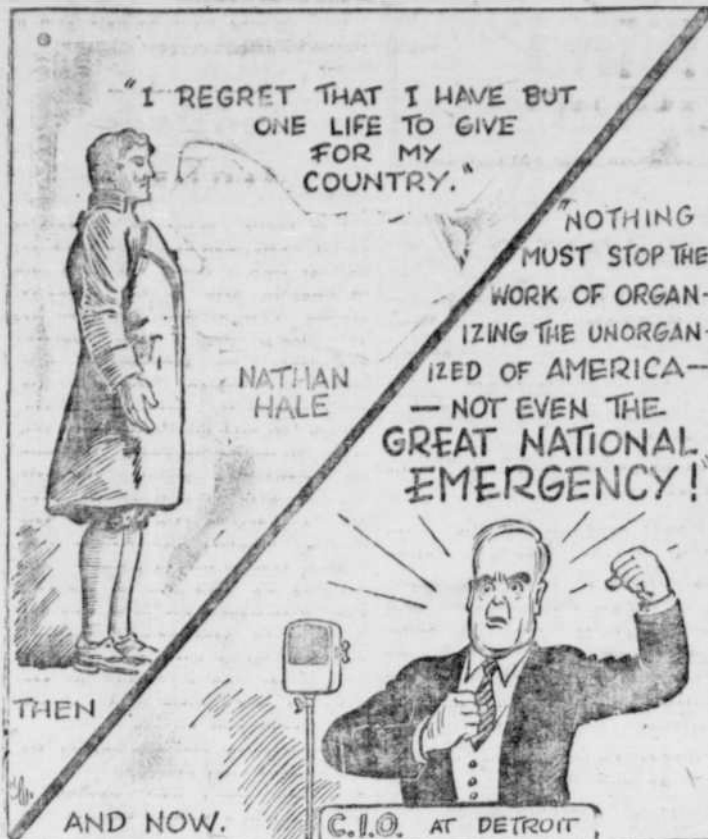

Bee men who have old combs that should be renewed will find it advantageous to have the old wax made into new foundation combs; or if they wish to sell it, they will receive the best price in years—about 38 cents per pound.
