SUGAR INDUSTRY EXPANSION

The group — 12 men from throughout the Idaho sugar beet area — passed with the governor's approval a resolution to use alien labor if it is sent into the state, kept under armed guard and concentrated in farming communities. "I am willing to guarantee personally that nobody in Idaho is going to lose any crop because of lack of labor," the governor commented, adding an appeal to the state's press for co-operation in quieting fears among farmers that help would not be forthcoming for the expanded crop sought to relieve the sugar shortage.

"Tell your people to get in and plant every acre that can be used for beets," he counseled the gathering. "We'll save every bit of the crop."

Clark said were it necessary he would order out state employees to work in beet fields and expressed belief counties and municipalities also would be willing to assist in a labor scarcity.

Patriotism of the state's citizenry, he declared, also could be counted on in a labor crisis.

As outlined by David Evans of Salt Lake City, public relations representative of the industry, the

department of agriculture has asked that enough beets be planted to utilize the full capacity of processing plants.

The Sugar City factory of the Utah-Idaho company would be reopened, about 5000 ore workers now being constructed by the Amalgamated Sugar company operated.

To double production, it was explained, about 5000 ore workers would be necessary than were employed last year.

Those at the meeting included Russell Richards of Boise, R. G. Larson of Nyssa, H. A. Elcock of Twin Falls, A. E. Benning of Ogden, all of the Amalgamated Sugar company; Carl Leonard, Filer beet grower; William Carson of Weiser, William Hogg of Marsing and H. A. Tieg of Nampa, leaders in the Nyssa-Nampa Sugar Beet Growers association; H. L. Stafford, administrative assistant for the agricultural adjustment administration in Idaho, and Agriculture Commissioner J. B. Newport.

Upon his return from the Boise meeting, Mr. Larson said that if the farmer gets \$10 for his beets, payments in Malheur county to growers will approximate \$2,000,000 for 1942. That figure will not include the payroll at the factory and other expenses.

Up to Monday night of this week the company had contracted in excess of 15,000 acres. The goal for the season is 30,000 acres. The acreage is being contracted at about 1000 to 2000 acres daily in the Nyssa-Nampa district.
