GREATER SUGAR PRODUCTION IS REQUIRED IN 1942

Apparently for the first time in history the old economic law of supply regulating price will be ineffective in 1942.

Because of war conditions and the great need for sugar for the American army, an urgent appeal has been issued to growers of sugar beets to increase their acreage during this year. Despite this great increase, expected to reach 100 per cent in the Nyssa-Nampa district, farmers will receive a record price for their beets.

The Amalgamated Sugar company, expecting to sign up 30,000 acres of land for the production of sugar beets in this territory, has already contracted for beets from more than 15,000 acres.

In addition to growing more beets in order to take advantage of the increase in price, farmers should boost their acreages as much as possible as a patriotic duty. Of course, farmers will face difficulties in raising sugar beets in 1942, but all Americans are facing unusual conditions this year.

Some wise man has said that an army marches on its stomach and it might be added that an important item in the food supply of a successful army is sugar, an energy-giving carbohydrate.

A greater amount of sugar should also be raised for civilian consumption as the imports of sugar from the Pacific area have been slashed to almost nothing. A million tons of sugar normally available from the Philippine islands has been cut off entirely and imports from other areas have been restricted.

This situation leaves the sugar industry in continental United States facing a mammoth job. The Amalgamated Sugar company feels that it will be able to do its part in increasing production.

Another important feature of the present program of expansion is the fact that in future years when quotas are clamped on again farmers will be thankful that they increased acreages because the 1942 production may be used as the basis of establishing quotas for various areas and individuals.

Nyssa residents hope that the farmers of this section will take advantage of their opportunities in providing more sugar for the army and the nation, accept the challenge as a patriotic duty and help to emphasize the importance of the sugar industry to the United States.

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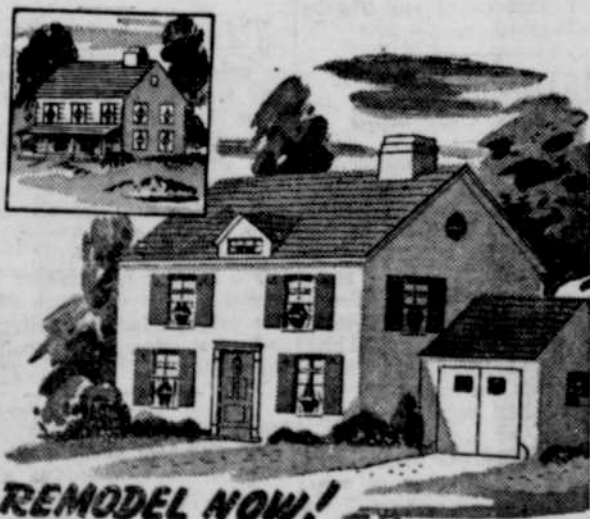
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
