BEEF PROGRAM IS HELD UNCHANGED

Recent suspension of sugar marketing quotas by President Roosevelt will not affect the sugar beet program. Pieter Tensen, county AAA chairman, reminds Malheur county sugar beet growers.

Quotas were suspended to permit a freer and more efficient movement of sugar for the domestic market and for the allies. Tensen said, and will also permit increased amounts of sugar to come in from off-shore areas in refined form rather than in the raw state.

"The marketing quota provisions of the sugar act have been very effective in stabilizing the sugar industry the past several years when excess sugar has been available to the American market," Tensen pointed out. "The situation is completely changed now, however, with reduced stocks in domestic producing area, with shipments cut off from the Philippines and curtailed from Hawaii, with the need to share sugar with the war allies, and with the general problem of transportation."

The fact that quotas could be suspended when advantages could be gained from such action indicates the flexibility of existing sugar legislation to deal with conditions involving either surplus or scarcity of sugar, Tensen said.

ROTENONE HELD FOR FOOD CROPS

Because the war and shipping difficulties have curtailed imports of rotenone, the war production board has issued an order dated April 13 to conserve present supplies for use as insecticides on important food crops, the Malheur county USDA war board has disclosed.

Effect of the order is to insure a supply of rotenone for controlling weevil on Austrian field peas, dry edible peas, canning peas, and other important Oregon food crops, Pieter Tensen, chairman of the county war board said.

The order prohibits the future use of rotenone in the manufacture of all sprays and dusts for control of household insects, poultry, pet and livestock parasites and

sprays for ornamental trees and shrubs. Use of rotenone products on the following crops is also prohibited: cotton, cranberries, eggplant, onions, peppers and sweet corn.

Sale of any rotenone products for other than one of the permitted uses is prohibited by the order. An exception to the foregoing use of rotenone manufactured prior to the date of the order.

The war board chairman also pointed out that the office of price administration has established ceiling prices on rotenone. Under terms of the order, cost to farmers of 1/2 percent rotenone should not be more than 2 1/2 cents per pound more than the price he paid last year.
