POLITICAL TRADITION UPSET BY SNELL VICTORY

In a strange interlude in Oregon's political history a governor has been ousted from office at a time when interest in politics was almost non-existent.

Political tradition has held for many years that when there is a lack of interest in an election, the ins stay in and the outs stay out. However, Earl Snell has overcome that tradition and has defeated Governor Charles Sprague for the republican nomination.

Mr. Snell won the election, probably because of his keenness as a politician, his ability and his popularity with organized groups. He is a good politician, although he does not give the appearance of making a conscious effort to win votes.

In the governorship race, the voters of Oregon had an opportunity to vote for and against two of the ablest men seeking the office in several years. Both men are capable, honest and morally fit. Governor Sprague has given Oregon an efficient administration and this paper predicts that Earl Snell will make an outstanding record as governor, if he overcomes the democratic nominee in November.

BEEF PHILOSOPHY

Is that not also the case with humans? It may not be necessary, but today the world is eliminating many young men that the remainder may live in comfort and develop naturally. Thousands of young men are dying that the idea of democracy and freedom may live and grow.
