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REDUCING DRIVING ESSENTIAL IN AMERICAN WAR PROGRAM

With motorists facing the opportunity of avoiding gasoline rationing, restrictions on motor vehicle sales, gasoline and tires have not yet been reflected in the motor vehicle registration trend in Oregon, according to figures compiled in the office of Secretary of State Earl Snell.

At the end of the first five months of the year, 394,511 vehicles were registered in the state, showing a slight increase over the 394,284 registered for the same period a year ago. Registration fees so far this year total \$2,796,890.33, compared to \$2,707,272.29 last year.

Motorists must realize that the question of whether gasoline rationing is inaugurated on the west coast will be largely determined by the people themselves. The principal factors that will determine whether rationing is to be done are rubber and transportation.

Automobile owners and others can help in the rubber situation by taking all of the scrap rubber they can lay their hands on to the service stations, where the material will be taken care of. Saving scrap rubber is not only going to help the service station operators and keep business on a fairly good level, but it is going to benefit the United States' war effort.

Motorists may help in postponing the day of rationing or avoiding it altogether by careful and thoughtful driving and using mass transportation whenever possible. They can also "double up" on trips with their neighbors to avoid driving two automobiles, when driving one would serve the purpose just as effectively.

Drivers can also save gasoline and tires by driving at a speed not in excess of 40 miles an hour. Greater speeds wear tires faster and reduce the efficiency of gasoline.

So don't forget, you folk riding around on those rubber tires are going to largely determine whether you are going to continue riding around, or whether you are going to be walking around.
