Americans at war celebrated the Fourth of July this year in an atmosphere of peace and quietude.

They have watched rodeos and long parades, purchased whiskey and worthless trinkets and munched pop corn, candy and "hot dogs".

In these celebrations we did not express appreciation for the liberty that was paid for with the blood of our forefathers, but merely gave vent to our emotions that have nothing to do with the rights of man or wars that have been fought to establish those rights.

We have, in effect, shouted from the house tops about our independence and have not prepared ourselves to retain that independence by building armaments or a moral fibre that gives a people a right to expect liberty. Today, we are pulling together a shattered national character and are feverishly building a war machine that we hope will be completed in time to overtake the enemy's crushing military giant.

Despite our lethargy of the past few years, our sensible celebration of the Fourth of July last week gives proof that our moral fibre is still there and is only stretched out of shape. When we were jerked up short by the realization of what we were celebrating on the Fourth of July, we forgot our thrill seeking and sought only to co-operate in the national program or looked for peace among the mountains or the surroundings of our own homes.

Hitler, Mussolini and Hirohito have brought to us what only war could teach us—that independence is something that must be fought for. All of life is like that. To appreciate our blessings, we must lose them; to retain them we must appreciate them.

SPRINKLERS MUST BE USED AT ALL TIMES

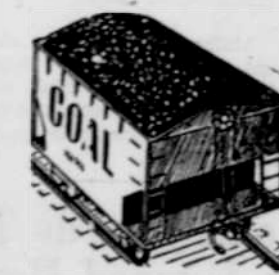
In case of fire sprinklers must be shut off.
