**WELL DRAINAGE PLAN IS TRIED**

Ontario, July 16 (Special)—The Malheur Drainage district has contracted with Allen E. Hosack for the drilling of a drainage well on the James Butler farm at Cairo. The well will be approximately 40 feet deep, with an 18 inch casing. This will be more or less an experimental well from which water will be pumped into the Owyhee ditch in an effort to drain a portion of the water-logged land in the district. According to the contract the well will be given a continuous 30-day

test to determine the feasibility of this method of drainage.
