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CONTROL OF WAGES AND FARM PRICES APPARENTLY COMING

From Washington comes the encouraging word that President Roosevelt expects to recommend to congress that action be taken in the matter of controlling wages and farm prices as a part of the program designed to prevent inflation.

Certainly no sane business man or other person desires wages and farm prices to be unduly held down, but they must be controlled along with prices of goods if inflation is to be prevented. If inflation comes, everyone and not just the man who pays wages, will be injured.

The report is rather surprising in view of the fact that control of wages and farm prices was not included in the original program, which places a ceiling on prices of commodities.

In his fight against the rising cost of living, President Roosevelt is expected to ask congress for broad and flexible authority to put ceiling on wages and farm prices.

Senate Democratic Leader Alban Barkley of Kentucky said that any recommendations made by the president will be given consideration by congress.

"We are interested in preventing inflation, just as the president is", Mr. Barkley said, "and we will be here to act on any proposals he may lay before us".

From the republican side Senator Vandenberg of Michigan said "any realistic plan that gears wages to price control is desirable because the effectiveness of price control is the only protection we have against suicidal inflation, and price control can't be effective if it only goes part way".

President Roosevelt's economic policies on many occasions have been faulty, but he certainly is benefitting the country with his price-control program. It is almost a certainty that we would be in the throes of inflation if the price control program had not been inaugurated.

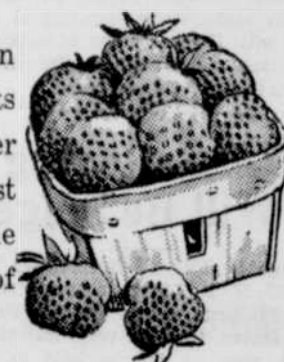
Farmers in this community are now harvesting their barley and wheat. Many expect to start haying next week.
