S. P. Bybee and Arvel L. Child have rented the F. E. Philips farm. They have been planting lettuce there the last week.

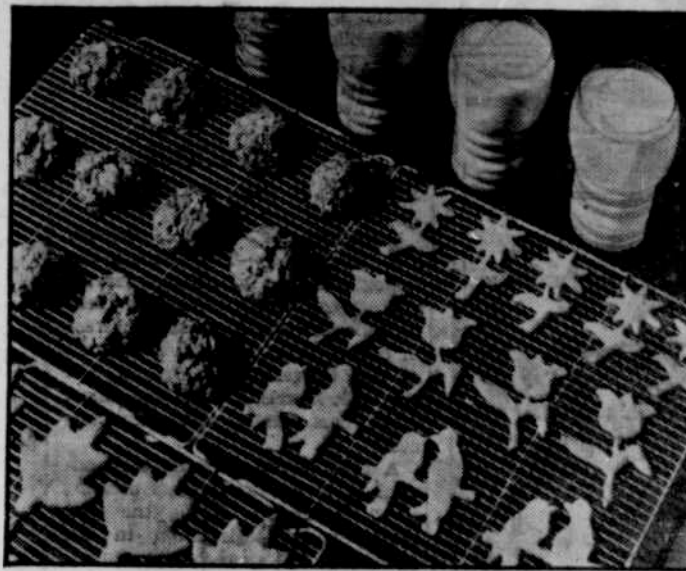
EXTENSION GROUP TO MEET
