**LARGE AUDIENCE HEARS RETURNED MISSIONARY**

On Sunday evening beginning at 8 p. m. a large crowd filling the entire chapel of the L.D.S. church listened to experiences and gospel teachings given by a returned missionary who had been in Pennsylvania for the past two years. Elder Willard A. Aston and W. Goates conducted the meeting. The meeting began with the congregation singing "Come Come Ye Saints". Invocation was given by George Poulsen. A piano solo was rendered by Mrs. Wanda Callahan. A song "Come Oh Thou King Of Kings" was sung by the choir, directed by Mrs. Nelda Schenk. The time was then turned over to Mr. Aston. While in the east, he spoke in prisons, in high schools, at civic clubs, even in vacant store houses, besides on the streets and in various churches. When out there 11

months he was called to preside over the Blue Ridge district, which included 22 counties.

An interesting experience he told of, was when they rented a three-story brick building for only \$10 per month, of how they remodeled it into a church, buying a piano for \$5 some old benches from a roller rink repainting them, building a pulpit, getting curtains, window blinds from good hearted neighbors etc. There were 47 people at the first meeting. They told the people "If you want to get your ears tickled, and help fill the pockets of false crying prophets, to go on down the street, because here we are not going to ask for any contributions, but are going to tell you the entire truth of the Gospel. Mr. Aston said "This turned out to be the most active branch in the eastern states. Lancaster Penn. is noted for being one of the best church and most religious cities in the east. They made window displays to

attract the passers-by. He told about the famous pageant that takes place once a year in New York at the Hill Cumorah. He took part in this pageant the last two years. It has a \$2,000 sound equipment device. Seventy-five thousand people turn out to see and hear the pageant.

Mr. Aston used a transmitter machine with phonograph records of the beautiful singing of the Mormon tabernacle choir and the great organ at Salt Lake City. In closing, Mr. Aston said "The Gospel, is the Power of God unto Salvation. It answers every question of life. If you live it, you will never know an unhappy day". He said, "Look back at your own problems and see if they are not the results of some of your own actions".

He spoke of the people who live riotously all week and sin, and partake of all manner of the devil's food, then turn to be religious on Sunday.

He said "Don't live by the light of a wax candle when you can have the glorious light from the rays of the true and latter day revelations".

He expressed his thanks for the privilege of being able to speak here in Nyssa. He said he would leave for the Service soon. "Live your religion, set an example for your sons and daughters to follow".

Oregon State College, Aug. 13 (Special)—Dr. August Leroy Strand, the newly elected president of O. S. C., who will become ninth head of the institution early in October, is a man of varied background, with both agricultural and scientific education and experience, and with proved administrative ability, according to officials of the state system of higher education and of this institution who took part in the search for a new executive. Dr. Strand comes to Oregon State after five years as president of his alma mater, Montana State college. While a native of Texas, his common, high school, and collegiate education were in Montana, although his graduate studies for both master's and doctor of philosophy degrees were at the University of Minnesota, where he specialized in entomology and zoology. On a recent visit to Oregon to be interviewed by the board and leaders of the college, Dr. Strand proved to be a large, affable man with a frank, straightforward manner. Both before and after his final election and acceptance those on the campus who met and talked with him were unanimous in speaking highly of his personality and general attitude. He succeeds acting president F. A. Gillfillan, who has served since the resignation a year ago of F. L. Ballard because of ill health.

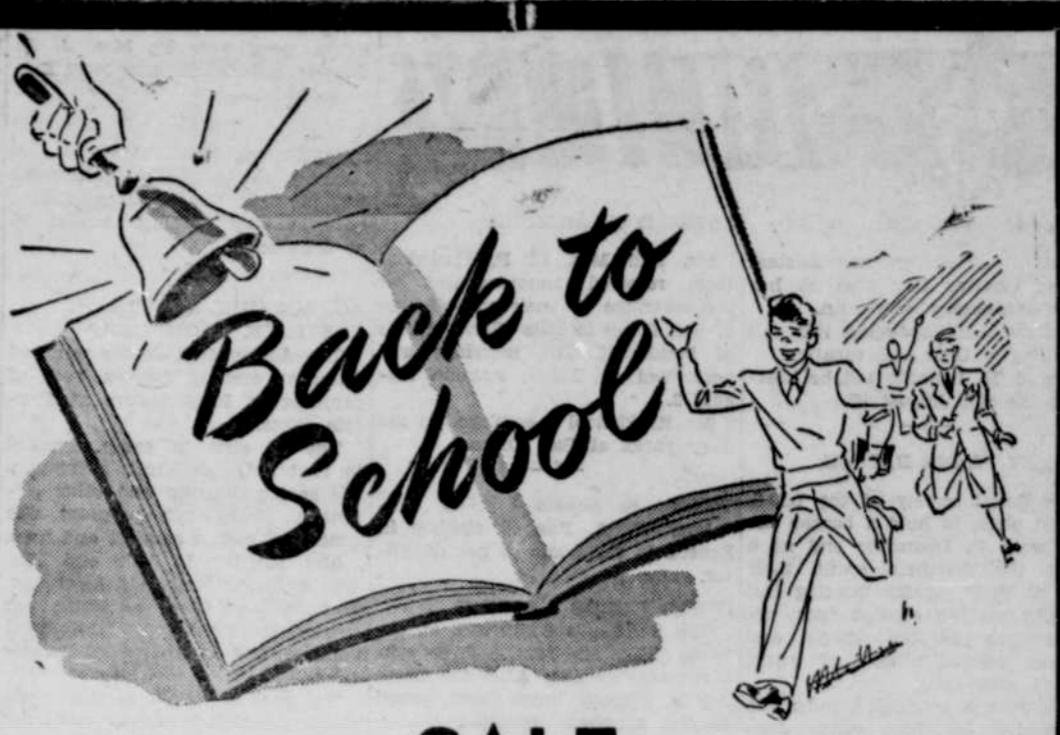
