Lumber Order Issued Under conservation order M-208, which controls all types and grades of softwood lumber after August 27, all lumber must be handled through priority regulations. Practically all construction that would be done by farmers falls into class 3, with an A-1-a rating. A-1-a includes construction of buildings destroyed or damaged by fire, buildings for storage of agricultural products, shelters, barns, pens or sheds for livestock, poultry or agricultural fences or gates, and maintenance and repair of farm buildings, other than dwellings, agricultural implements and agricultural machinery, parts, accessories and equipment.
