Leroy Smith went to Washington to see his daughter recently. He has been staying at the H. E. Noah home.

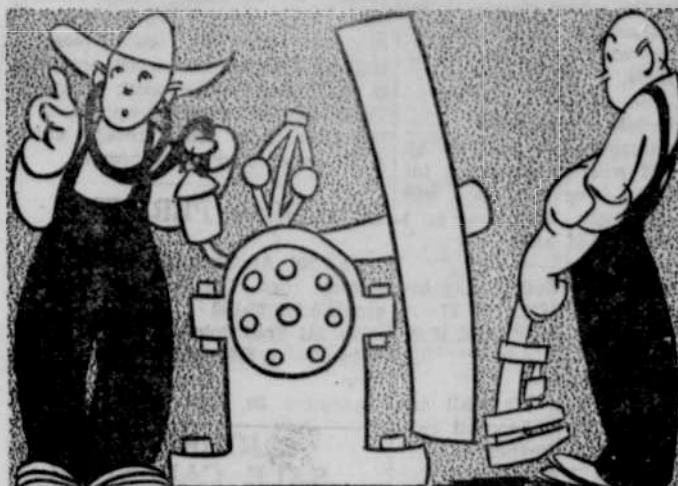

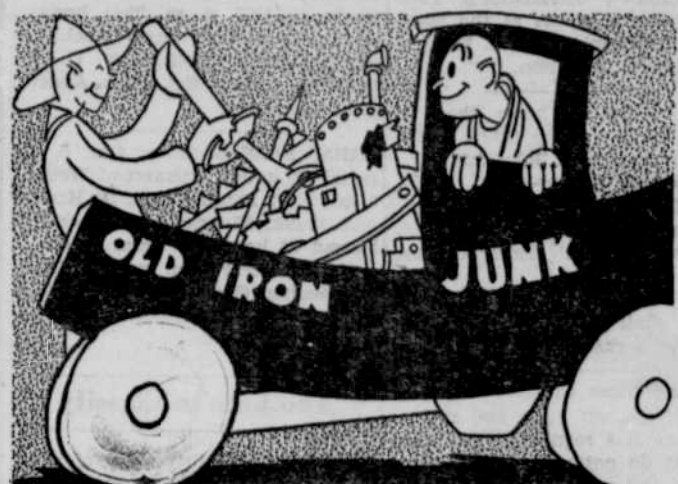
## Oregon Trail

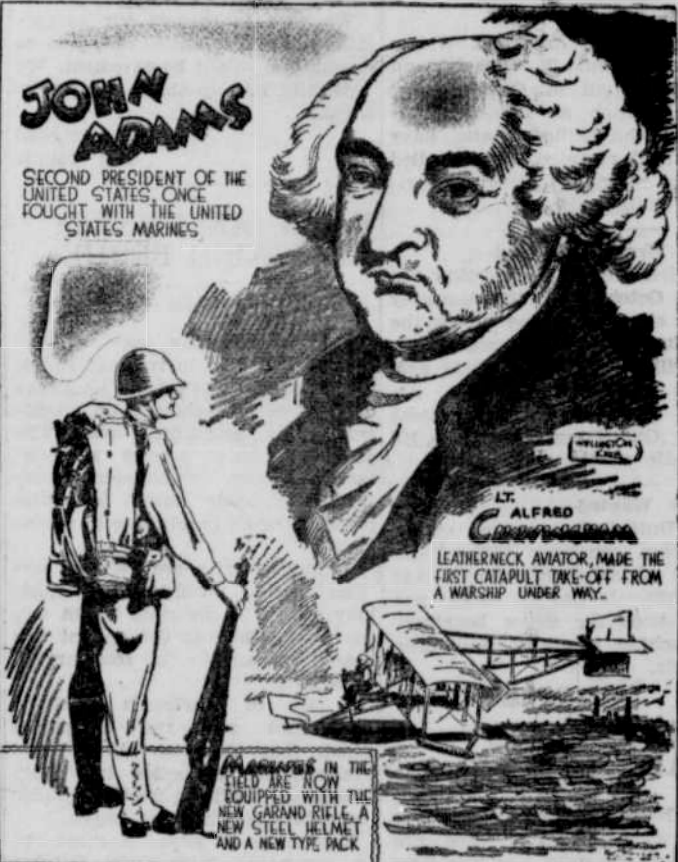

## VICTORY FOODS

Every housewife I've talked to in

How about canning Tomato Soup to feed your family on cold winter evenings? Here's the recipe.

**TOMATO SOUP**  
14 quarts tomatoes 14 stalks celery, 7 onions, 3 green peppers, 7 T. sugar, 14 T. flour 5 T. Salt, 1 T. pepper, 1 lb. butter, 14 cloves, 3 bay leaves.

Cover vegetables with water and cook until tender, then run them through a colander. Cook tomatoes until done and then put them through the colander also. Combine liquids. Heat. Add seasonings. Add flour and butter which have been combined. Seal hot.

The rest of the personnel will remain unchanged, Mr. Jones added. Mr. Jones has agreed to continue as a director. The other directors will be Mr. Masterson and Mr. Miller. Officers have not yet been elected.

## NEWSPAPER BEST "BUY" IN WORLD, STATES BABSON

The public has come to rely upon advertisements. In countless instances, people make it a practice to read the ads first and the news stories second. Naturally, there is some waste in advertising, but 90 per cent of it is good.

Generally, the individual or firm which foots a bill for advertising expects his ad to "pay its way." The return in merchandise sales per dollar spent for space is carefully watched by retailers and other advertisers. In certain types of copy featuring the sales of shoes, dresses, and various other articles of consumer goods, a merchant can determine an hour after his store opens for business whether or not the advertisement is a success.

The average reader accepts his newspaper as a matter of course. Newspapers are, however, as important to their communities as are municipal conveniences and services. A newspaper is the greatest buy in the world. All newspapers, regardless of size are highly educa-

tional. Unlike other great institutions of learning, however, they are not endowed and must be self-supporting. Naturally, what keeps a newspaper going is its advertising revenue.

## SOIL BUILDING DEADLINE NEARS

Only a short time remains for Malheur county farmers to perform range and soil building practices under the 1942 farm program, Pieter Tensen, chairman of the county AAA committee, said this week.

All conservation practices must be completed by October 31 to be included for payment under the 1942 program. Practices completed after that date will be considered as completed during the 1943 program year, Tensen explained.

Stressing that wartime food production hinges on the farm plant being maintained in peak condition, Tensen suggested that farmers who find they are short of earning their full AAA soil building allowance make every effort to do so before October 31. Unless soil fertility is maintained, the chances of maintaining a high production of war-needed food and fiber will be greatly reduced, the chairman said.

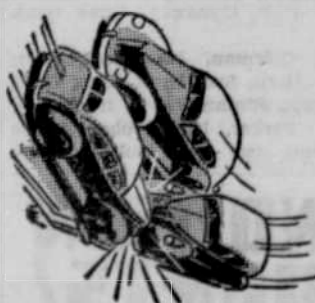
