CHADWICK GIVES METALS APPEAL

Nyssa, Oregon (To the Editor). As a member of your local scrap metal drive committee, I earnestly beg each and all to join in making this a success. Must our own streets run red with blood to wake us from our lethargy? In order for steel mills to operate at capacity 17,000,000 tons of scrap must be harvested at once.

To equip one soldier requires 26 pounds of scrap. Let's each one adopt some soldier and see to it personally that he is equipped. Who is he that would keep worthless scrap lying around stained with the blood of his fellow countrymen, to haunt him like a ghost; you've been asking what can I do. Here is what you can do. Search your homes, farms, garages, every place where scrap might be hiding. Every ounce from rusty nails to worn out tractors-is needed. Where did you put the old flat iron when you purchased the new electric? It's good for 30 hand grenades. Thirty hand grenades good for thirty cold rats.

I appeal to every patriotic American in or near Nyssa. And earnestly hope there are none other to join in this drive wholeheartedly. Let's not have one casualty charged to us. Let's get this scrap.
