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GASOLINE RATIONING FOR TRUCKS HURTING FARMERS

Farmers living in this community have found themselves, using mechanized farming methods, faced with drastic curtailment of operations because of the gasoline rationing program, which became effective December 1.

Unless the farmers are given relief, many of them simply cannot carry on their business, because after all, the speed and extent of farm operations have increased as they have in the city.

However, protests filed with the government officials indicate that something will be done to relieve the producers. So far as is known, mileage of only 3100 miles a year has been allotted to every truck and pick-up and many trucks are operated eight or ten times that far in a year.

Dairymen are finding it necessary to eliminate deliveries to residences until some relief is given by the government in the mileage rationing.

Apparently the plan is administered by someone who is not familiar with the needs of an agricultural community. However, the government may expect farm truck operators to apply for more mileage.
