Columbia Power
Might Boosted

Portland, Jan. 7 (Special) Bonneville and Grand Coulee Dams, gigantic federal power projects on the Columbia river, have become an integral part of the war might of the United States, Power Administrator Paul J. Raver said today in his annual report to the secretary of the interior.

"Both from the standpoint of actual power deliveries and from the standpoint of 'demand value' of contracts executed, the administration's power sales showed heavy gains during the fiscal year 1942," the administrator stated. "Of power actually delivered, war industries comprising principally aluminum and shipbuilding, as well as chemicals and other munitions of war, purchased 81.4 per cent, private utility companies 14.7 per cent, public agencies 3.8 per cent, and federal agencies 0.1 per cent.

"By June 30, 1942, industrial power contracts and commitments dominated the administration's marketing program and construction plan. Industrial loads, all of them for war production, accounted directly for 92 per cent of current contracts and commitments for 899,920 kilowatts."

Administrator Raver said the outbreak of war found the administration already far along in its war production program and through advanced planning prepared to take on even greater war loads.

"The declaration of war and the decision to locate many war loads east of the Cascade mountains made necessary certain major changes in the administration's 1942-43 program," he stated. "But it nevertheless found the administration in a position to meet the war strategy with changes only as to location of additional lines and substitution facilities, thus justifying the basic planning of the system."

"The impact of the war program in the area served by the administration was reflected by the placing of war contracts totaling \$1,259,449.00. These covered the manufacture of aircraft, ships, ordnance, military and naval supplies and the construction of barracks, docks and munition depots, all in Oregon and Washington. This figure does not include the purchase of raw materials such as aluminum, copper, zinc, lead and timber products in the area."

STAGE FIRM NOW
WITH TRAILWAYS

Bend, Oregon, Jan. 7 (Special)—Mt. Hood Stages, Inc., operating a fleet of motor coaches between Portland, The Dalles, Bend, Klamath Falls, Prairie City and Ontario, Oregon, and between Boise and Weiser, Idaho, has become affiliated with the National Trailways Bus system, comprising 41 connecting bus lines throughout the United States.

The company will operate under the name of the Pacific Trailways and will retain headquarters in Bend, where the firm was organized

in 1931 by the consolidation of bus lines operated by Pickwick Greyhound system and the Hoover stages. First officers were Myrl P. Hoover, president and general manager; Gene Allen, vice president, and Delbert Mattson, secretary-treasurer.

While Allen was with the company, it acquired the holdings of the Northland Greyhound Lines between Bend and Klamath Falls and the Pacific Greyhound lines between Bend and Eugene. In 1934, Mattson's interest was acquired by William Niskanen, now secretary-treasurer.

Other lines have been acquired in Oregon and Idaho, and through service established from western and central Oregon to Boise.

The management personnel of the Pacific Trailways will be Myrl P. Hoover, president and general manager; Maurice Hoover, vice-president; William Niskanen, secretary-treasurer; W. K. Euson, superintendent of transportation, and Ed Parsons, superintendent of maintenance. G. P. Chester, former northwest passenger agent of the Union Pacific states, will become associated with the firm on January 5, as traffic manager.

The traditional blue and white colors of Mt. Hood Stages will prevail for the duration, as war conditions will not permit the repainting of buses to National Trailways' color scheme of cardinal red with trimming of yellow orange.

MORE SUBSTITUTES FOR
WHEAT

In addition to the eight designated war crops—potatoes, dry beans, dry edible peas, canning peas, tomatoes for processing, flax for seed or fiber and vetch for seed—the following crops may be substituted for wheat to meet 90 per cent of allotment requirements for the 1943 AAA program: Legume hay, oats and vetch or oats and peas for hay, permanent pastures, Austrian peas, hay, barley or permanent pastures must be above normal plantings.

WHEAT MAY MOVE TO MILLS
