DIETS REPORTED ABOVE AVERAGE

"Ring out the old, ring in the new," is a New Year's slogan as applicable to the family food supply as in other fields, said Mrs. Amy S. Larkin, chairman of the Malheur county nutrition committee for defense. This is the traditional time for reviewing the past, looking to the future, and for making resolutions, she said.

Despite the beginnings of rationing and a few shortages, diets in this country were better for the past two years than for the previous five years, reports Mrs. Mabt Mack, extension nutritionist at Oregon State college. Reasons were that many families had more money to spend for food, while many others spent what they had more wisely as a result of the national nutrition campaign.

In 1943, however, more money to buy food and more interest in good nutrition will not be enough to insure better diets, says Mrs. Mack. Civilians will be unable to get as much of some important foods such as meat, butter, milk and many vegetables and fruits as they would be able and willing to buy.

Cereals will be plentiful in 1943. Fats and oils will be somewhat restricted. The family dinner table may not offer as many fried foods, rich gravies, sauces, and oily dressings as in the past year. Sugar supplies may be smaller because of the transportation situation. Families will probably eat more grain foods, potatoes, and beans for the food energy they have been getting from sugar.

More sweet potatoes and dried beans in 1943, are in prospect because large crops this year supplied a big carry-over, while white potato supplies are not large.

Fresh fruits and vegetables in the new year will depend on crops, labor, and the shipping situation. Restrictions on commercial canning will mean fewer canned fruits and vegetables on the grocery shelves. Family gardens and home food preservation will be more important than ever.

Increased production of poultry and eggs is expected, but the demand will be tremendous. Rationing of meat is promised so whatever the supply is, all will get a fair share.

The total milk supply will be about the same but probably less will be available for civilians.
