



GUESTS AT DINNER

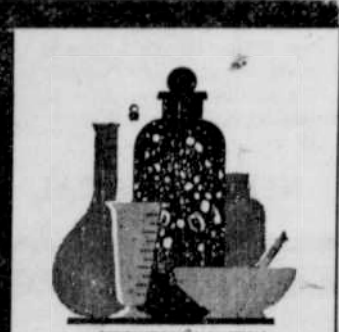

The modification of the tire inspection program, which was announced by the OPA in Washington a few days ago, allows holders of "A" books until March 31 of this year to have their tires inspected and provides that the tires must be inspected once every six months.

Holders of "B" and "C" books have until February 28 for tire inspection every four months, and "C" operators, every three months.

"This action was taken by OPA to relieve tire inspectors from a last minute rush which they probably would have been unable to handle," said Mr. Atkeson.

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JURORS FOR JAN. TERM DISMISSED

Vale, Jan. 28 (Special)—The jury members for the January term of court found they had nothing to do when they assembled in the circuit court room at the courthouse last week so were dismissed by Judge Robert M. Ducan, until the next term of court, which will be held in April.

Thirteen cases at law and 35 cases in equity, however, were either dismissed or settled out of court during this term of court. Three criminal cases were dismissed and one person, indicted for forgery, pleaded guilty and was given a suspended sentence. In the case of A. J. Swan versus John Koopman, the plaintiff was granted a judgment of \$525.15 by Judge Ducan. The case was heard last week.

FSA CLINIC WILL BE OPENED HERE

The farm security administration has taken a lease on the Thompson building on Main street between Third and Fourth streets for a clinic, which will be operated there until the new FSA camp east of the railroad tracks is opened.

Doctors will hold a clinic one night a week for those who hold FSA medical cards. The nurse will be at the building nearly every day. Any FSA client who makes a call at a doctor's office should see the nurse first at the clinic. The building has been completely renovated by the owners.
