VICTORY FOOD HINTS

Leona Anderson Home Service Advisor Idaho Power Co. "FAT MAKES GLYCERINE-BAVE IT!"

Chicken fat may be used in pastry for pies, in biscuits, muffins, cornbread, cakes and cookies. It liquefies quickly at room temperature and should be stored in the refrigerator; to "cream" in cakes or cookies, place sugar in bowl first, add fat, and blend thoroughly. Use standard recipes and proceed as usual with this one exception in the first step.

Bacon fat and other clean, clear fat may be used in cakes and cookies with spicy or molasses flavors, in cornbread, gingerbread, sauces, vegetables, etc.

To clarify or "reclaim" drippings for cooking or baking: Place in saucepan, add 2 or 3 times as much water, heat till fat is melted and stir well. Cool, place in refrigerator to chill thoroughly. Lift off layer of fat, drain on paper towel, pack into dish, store in refrigerator.

To salvage fat from roasting or frying pan: Pour or skim pure fat through fine wire sieve into tin can. Add one or two cupfuls of water to pan, bring to a boil, stirring and swishing water around to collect fat. Pour into small bowl, cool, place in refrigerator to chill; remove layer of hardened fat and add to tin of salvage fat.

Save all fat trimmings from raw and cooked steaks, chops, roasts, etc. Place in refrigerator dish, and when filled, render and add to tin of salvage fat.

Not even a teaspoonful of fat skinned from the soup or gravy or left in the frying or roasting pan, or the smallest piece of fat trimming should find its way to the garbage can for the duration, or after the duration, for that matter.

Remember—16 tablespoons equal a cupful; 2 cupfuls of fat usually make a pound; the pound of salvage fat you turn in this week may furnish the glycerine which stops an enemy tank on the battle front where your boy is fighting.

OATMEAL MUFFINS
1 Cup flour
1 t. baking powder
½ t. salt
2 T. sugar
2 cups oatmeal
1 egg
1 cup milk
3 T. chicken or bacon fat
Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Add oatmeal. Beat eggs, add milk and melted shortening. Combine dry ingredients and liquids, stirring just enough to moisten dry ingredients. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full. Bake at 400 degrees for about 20 minutes.
