VALUABLE PUBLICITY

Over five million people read about Oregon's resources and advantages last week in an impressive article by Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, Jr., which appeared in several national magazines, Time, U. S. News, Editor and Publisher and Advertising Age. It is well illustrated, direct as a tracer bullet and splendid publicity for our undeveloped state.

"In thinking of Oregon—make no little plans," advises Mr. Farrell in the caption and in signal phrases says, "War demands have lifted the lid on Oregon's treasure chest of natural resources. . . Oregon is solid. . . It's political stability protects individual opportunity. . . keeps your future dynamic. . . take heart in Oregon's war-promised foods. . . a crop failure is unknown." The article is used in a full page institutional proclamation by the Portland Oregonian.

Farm War News

FARM LABOR PICTURE

The week's farm labor front developments include: First contingent of Mexican workers en route to the northwest to help sugar beet growers.

Close to 1800 Mexicans are arriving weekly in California and Arizona. This rate will be increased until between 35,000 and 50,000 are on hand to meet harvest peaks in the eight western states. More families are arriving from mid-south areas to work on Oregon and Washington dairy and vegetable farms.

Selective service boards will provide county USDA war boards with names of registrants in certain classes who have had farm experience and who are not now in essential jobs.

With possible army induction as an alternative, skilled farm workers thus located will be asked to take

To assist him in this work, Mr. Ryan appointed to serve on the committee the following: H. F. Logue, Chet Lackey, J. B. Adrian, Thomas Jones.

Plans of the committee are to contact members of the County Court in regards to financing such a project, which Mr. Meachem points out could be carried out with very little expense and should be done while traces of the famous old trail are still discernible in this section.

SEED SPUD PRICES

A new OPA regulation limits the 75 cent premium for seed potatoes to potatoes sold, delivered or in transit as seed stock before April 10, sales by a producer to another nearby farmer for seed, and potatoes sold to dealers or others who have a certification from the county USDA war board that seed potatoes are needed in the county. All other sales must be made at not more than the ceiling price for table stock potatoes.

FOOD FRONT BRIEFS

Used trucks have been brought under price control for the first time. . . Farm butter has been placed under price ceiling comparable to creamery butter. Ration stamps must be collected, of course, for all farm-churned butter sold. . . On regular schedule since August, relief shipments of food averaging 18,000 tons monthly are being transported to Greece. . . Lieut. Col. Jay L. Taylor has been appointed deputy administrator of food production in charge of labor.
