Mrs. America Meets The War

Mrs. America can be certain of obtaining useful and well-wearing types of blankets despite the war production board conservation order reducing the variety and sizes of cotton, rayon and wool covers. No blankets will be made longer than 84 inches except white cotton sheet blankets which are limited to 95 inches in length. Each line of blankets also is limited to no more than four colors plus white, and the multi-designed blankets are restricted to combinations which do not take more than four colors plus white. Before the order, a single line had as many as 15 different colors. It is expected that the number of blankets produced will be increased by the material savings of the conservation order.

Rationing at a glance for the month of May—meat, canned fish, cheese and edible fats and oils, red stamps lettered "E" valid now until May 31 and other red stamps for month expiring on same date but can be used only on and after dates listed: F, May 2; G, May 9; H, May 16; and J, May 23. (Red A, B, C, and D stamps expire on April 30) Processed fruits and vegetables, blue G, H, and J stamps valid through-out month of May. (Blue D, E, and F stamps expire on April 30) Coffee stamp number 23, good for one pound through May 30. Sugar stamp number 12 good for five pounds of sugar through May 31. Gasoline, coupons numbered 5 in "A" book good until May 21.

The carriage trade will be served despite mileage rationing, just as long as it's Mrs. America's Junior. For the WPB has allowed the production of baby carriages to be increased to match the demands of the war. Strollers, baby walkers, and stulks also are permitted to be manufactured by June 30.

To take that stitch in time Mrs. America should not have any difficulty in buying ordinary cotton sewing thread. But here's what's in store for Mrs. America's sewing basket. Deeper colors of thread may be somewhat less abundant because of restrictions on dyestuffs. Although silk sewing thread has not been produced for some time, rayon thread still is being made. And needles will have a special place in the sewing basket for these as well as pins for household use are scarce. However, buy needles and pins only as they're needed for hoarded supplies are likely to rust and lose their usefulness.

Used washing machines have become so valuable since production of new models stopped that the

OPA has set dollars and cents maximum prices on all sales of used washers by individuals and dealers alike. The regulation, which becomes effective May 3, also sets a ceiling on rental charges of used washing machines. The new price ceilings should eliminate any excessive prices which might be asked because of a heavy demand for this scarce equipment. The regulation establishes a ceiling price on guaranteed machines at March 1942 levels and at October 1941 levels on machines sold "as is". Every used washing machine, whether sold by a dealer or an individual, must have a tag showing its classification and the maximum selling price.

Look for a larger number of fruits, vegetables, juices, meats, fish and dairy products to be commercially packed in glass for civilians this year. This is because the War production board has allotted sufficient metal and rubber for closures for the additional glass containers.

While many housewives are preparing to put winter woollens away for the warmer months, tips from the department of agriculture bureau of human nutrition and home economics come in pretty handy. A copy of "Take Care of the Wool You Have", which tells how to clean, wash, press, mend and store wool, may be obtained from the department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., and it's helpful advice in these days when conservation of woollens is a wartime duty. Here are directions for storing winter wool: first, put it away clean and store in a dark, dry, cool place, remembering that dampness invites mildew. Be sure the trunk, closet or bag in which woollens are stored is sealed tightly.

And here's more information on protection of woollens. The WPB assures us that there will be enough mothballs and flakes to fight clothes moths, but not enough to waste. For moth balls and flakes call for the glistening white naphthalene which also helps war on the Axis. Naphthalene goes into smokeless powder, synthetic rubber, dye-stuffs for uniforms, protective coatings for shooting equipment, among other things. Sprays for killing moths are not so plentiful as before, but other items in closet war category are available such as the white cry-

stal paradichlorobenzene which is similar to naphthalene crystals. Of course, if you're interested in cedar chests, you'll find that styles will be simplified since the use of metal for locks, nails and screws has been restricted.
