

Data Given On County's Nurse

Mrs Edna Farris, county health nurse, this week released a report on public health nurse activities in Malheur county during the period from January 1, 1942 to April 1, 1943.

Mrs Farris said the first three months of the period was spent in placing the office and records in working order.

"Eleven services were carried," Mrs Farris stated. "These services are as follows: Communicable disease, venereal disease, tuberculosis, pre-natal, maternity, infant, pre-school, school, adult hygiene, morbidity (sickness), crippled children's service. Total admissions to all services 694 persons, dismissals 509, cases carried 185, total number of visits to patients 2357. The three heaviest case loads were tuberculosis, morbidity and school in order given here. The most neglected services were venereal disease, pre-natal, maternity and infant. The present official personnel is entirely inadequate to carry all of these services as they should be carried. Immunizations have been stressed during the last year. This has been a time-consuming and expensive service to the county. The records since April, 1942 show 818 smallpox vaccinations, 1902 persons inoculated against diphtheria (272 under 5th birthday), 1184 Schick tests given

(233 positive reactors), 1902 tuberculin tests given (99 positive reactors), and 185 chest x-ray examinations. This includes the 99 positive reactors picked up in school clinics. 101 school children, all members of the 4-H health clubs, were given physical examinations by physicians and 438 dental inspections by dentist.

Other activities include 4340 persons inspected by physician or nurse and 168 demonstration of inspection given by nurse to teachers. Remedial corrections include eight refractions and 36 tonsillectomies. 107 visits in behalf of general sanitation were made. 87 children were examined by orthopedic specialists from Portland in the three crippled children's clinics held in the county during the last 15 months. Other activities of nurse include 2685 administrative interviews, 93 organized clinics conducted, 81 demonstrations of nursing care of sick patients, 111 class hours were spent in Red Cross home nursing classes. These classes were held at night except a class at Juntura through July and August.

"Meetings attended by nurse include 25 group meetings, 18 health association meetings, 23 committee and board meetings, 27 professional meetings and 28 staff conferences. Sixty seven talks given by nurse at meetings attended by 1926 persons. The brief outline of activities gives some idea of the accomplishments. The cooperation of the county court, physicians and dentists of the county, parents and teachers,

pupils, organized groups, official and civic, of the state and county and of the press have made these accomplishments possible.

ONTARIO HOLDING LEAD IN CONTEST

Bend, Baker, Ontario and Bandon continued to hold the lead in the 1943 Oregon cities traffic safety contest in the April standings, it was announced today by Robert S Farrell, Jr., secretary of state and sponsor of the contest.

In the first division, Bend has held the lead for more than two years, winning first place in 1941, in 1942 and retaining the lead so far through 1943. In second place in the first division was Eugene with Astoria, third; Salem, fourth; Klamath Falls, fifth; Portland, sixth; Medford, seventh.

In the second division, Baker held first place with Marshfield second and Corvallis third. Ontario was in first place in the third division with Seaside second and Hood River third. In the fourth division, Bandon was followed by Enterprise in second place and Mt. Angel third.

Contest standings are based on the percentage of improvement in accident experience for the current period compared to the city's own previous three-year average.

HAZARDOUS FIRE SEASON IS FACED

Forest protective organizations and timberland owners in the Pacific northwest face the prospect of the most dangerous and hazardous forest fire year in history without benefit of federal emergency funds such as were used to such good advantage last year. A \$6,500,000 emergency fund has been cut from the special deficiency appropriation budget. This would have been divided among the states for use against enemy sabotage and for preventative purposes.

Leaders in both Oregon and Washington forest industries circles, state officials and fire protective association wardens are bringing terrific pressure on western congressmen to get emergency forest fire fighting funds reinstated and are asking the general public's support.

"Our need is greater than ever and the possibility of sabotage of our forests puts the Pacific Coast in the combat zone of this war," said Orville Miller, president of the West Coast Lumbermen's association. "The extra help must come from congress to increase the effectiveness of our forest fire fighting organizations by adding extra men to meet enemy attacks against our forests."

Phone Replaces U.P. Telegraph

Salem, Ore., May 6--A victim of the urgencies of war times, the scarcity of railroad telegraphers and probably due in a measure to the dwindling of the town itself, caused the Union Pacific railroad to close its Crane, Oregon, agency station on April 30. But because of the co-operative efforts of Commissioner Ormond R. Bean and Senator Charles L. McNary the trains will continue to stop at the famous old Harney county cow town, and caretaker with a telephone in place of a telegraph instrument will arrange for shipments of wool, sheep and cattle.

The arrangement is expected to provide a minimum of annoyance to the people in and around Crane.

Crane is on a U.P. Branch that starts at Ontario and ends at Burns.

Crane reached its peak of importance about 1923. It was then the end of the branch road, and boomed in the good old way when the rum-or was spread that its railroad was destined to cross the state from East to West.

With the passing of that dream, the town began to fade. It was again set back when the paved highway swung away from the town to the present Stinkingwater mountain pass.

Today Crane has a high school that serves a large part of the upper Harney valley, a hotel, a store and a garage and a population of 150. Twenty persons signed the petition to keep their shipping station supplied with a telegraph operator.
