**COLONIAL BEGINNINGS**

THE NEW ENGLAND COLONISTS, LACKING VIRGINIA'S TOBACCO CROP AND FERTILE SOIL, TURNED TO THE SEA FOR THEIR LIVELIHOOD.

GREATEST FRIEND OF OUR COLONIAL SHIPPING WAS JOHN WINTHROP, FIRST GOVERNOR OF MASSACHUSETTS, WHOSE TINY SLOOP "BLOSSOM OF THE BAY," 1630, TRADED ALONG THE NEW ENGLAND COAST AND EVEN WITH THE DUTCH ON MANHATTAN ISLANDS.

FROM THOSE MODEST BEGINNINGS, COASTAL AND INTERCOASTAL TRADE GREW STEADILY. BY THE TIME OF OUR ENTRANCE INTO THE WAR, MORE THAN HALF OUR TOTAL TONNAGE WAS DEVOTED EXCLUSIVELY TO THESE OPERATIONS.

## Limit Is Put On Canning Sugar

The office of price administration, Washington, D. C. has placed a limit of 25 pounds of sugar per person for canning and freezing of this year's fruit crop. However, sugar for home canning will be allotted on substantially the same basis as last year—one pound of sugar for every four quarts of fruit. The amount of sugar allowed for each person for jams, jellies and preserves has been increased from one pound to five pounds. Ration boards will begin receiving applications for canning sugar May 15. Application may be made either in person or by mail. Each applicant must show a war ration book No. 1 and estimate the number of quarts or pounds of fruit he expects to can.

ferred to the enlisted reserve corps and be released to return to essential war jobs, including agriculture. Application is made by the enlisted man to his commanding officer, supported by a written statement from his prospective employer. The release must be approved by the state director of selective service. Under certain conditions, soldiers may also be furloughed for a period up to 90 days to do essential farm work. This applies mostly to highly skilled men, such as harvester operators.

The first meeting, held April 19, was followed by other meetings throughout Malheur county April 20, 21, 22 and 23. With a full attendance of the board of directors and employees, the matter of procedure in organizing an educational committee in the unit for permanent action was the principal topic at the first meeting. Several men and women volunteered to serve on such a committee so that the educational department is very much encouraged with the reception of the program.

How the huge collection of 183,704,113 pounds of scrap metal by Chevrolet dealers helps build the weapons needed to exterminate the foes of freedom is graphically depicted above. Roughly, the dealers gathered enough scrap metal to build 20 submarines, 10 destroyers, two cruisers and 700 thirty-ton tanks. Other important scrap materials, such as rubber, papers, etc., included in the collection, an activity of the Victory Service League, boosted the total to 197,655,106 pounds, or nearly 100,000 tons.
