STALIN FLABBERGASTS WORLD WITH ACTION

Joseph Stalin has just about knocked the props out from under the pretense of Hitler and the other axis leaders of fighting the communism bogie to save the world from slavery.

The premier of Russia has called for the dissolution of the comintern, the international body of communism, perhaps as a cooperative gesture toward the other united nations, and perhaps for some other reason. In any event, about the only bogie Hitler and Mussolini now have to hold before their people is the poor disarmed and disfranchised Jew.

Hitler has been playing the communism spectre to the limit, both among his own people and the people of the united nations. He has been teaching his people hatred of communism and has been attempting to use the dislike of democracies for the red program as an entering wedge to split the various branches of the united nations. Now, that phase of Hitler's propaganda machine, must be pretty well wrecked.

The other side of the picture is about as complicated. The comintern was considered by the Russians as "the general staff of world revolution", inferring that the program of the soviet regime was to work against other governments in an attempt to overthrow them, and that was the interpretation given by Americans.

After all these years, the Russians have declared their policy of spreading anarchism is obsolete. What caused the change of heart, perhaps no one will ever know. At least the action has flabbergasted the axis and encouraged the countries fighting with Russia.

However, everyone is going to take the announcement with a grain of salt and save their convictions for a later date.

Capital Parade

The state's new financial responsibility law which becomes effective June 9, along with a large number of acts of the 1943 legislature, will create another branch in the extensive department of the secretary of state. Jargonized the law means: buy insurance on your car, or else. This wildfall to insurance companies and agents is getting spread thin however. A hatch of new insurance agents has swarmed out for

the new business. Everbodies don't. Don't laugh in his face if your milkman asks you to buy car insurance from him. He may be carrying insurance as a side line. One of the big department stores here, the one nearest the capitol, is putting in an insurance counter-just across the aisle from the auto parts department.

PRISONERS TO ARMY
State prison inmates will be drafted into the army upon termination of their sentence or on parole. A special draft board has been set up to handle them and earlier releases will be made for induction.

The exceptions are those who have been convicted of such crimes as arson and sex offenses.

OREGON LEADS

Ten per cent of Oregon's population was enrolled in national war production training schools, a per capita percentage that leads the nation. O. I. Paulson, state director of vocational education states, Washington was second, with 8 per cent of its residents enrolled in classes. Those who are not skilled should acquire a skilled trade now as the post war period will undoubtedly be a severe era for the unskilled workman.

KNOX SAYS NIX

Dr. William Knox, father of the Knox liquor law, has refused to accept Governor Earl Snell's appointment to a committee to confer with the state liquor control commission to draft a temperance educational program for schools. The governor appointed Dr. J. R. Montague, Portland physician to the committee.

ARMY NURSES WANTED

An urgent need for army nurses exists. Oregon's quota is set for 65,000, the expectancy 8000 a month. Nurses may become members of the armed forces or may join the nurses aid department as civilians. The Red Cross is the official recruiting agency for the government. Volunteers for either organization may call on or write to any Red Cross unit for information.

WOMEN COUNT

The war department has notified Col. J. J. Fulmer, commander of the Oregon recruiting district, that women enrolling in the women's army are considered a part of the total strength of the nation's army. The national army of 11,000,000 probably will consist of ten million men and one million women.

HANDICAPPED CHILDREN

An appropriation of \$140,000 was made by the 1943 legislature for the children. As superintendent of state education of physically handicapped schools, Rex Putnam, points out a district must comply with the provisions of the law if reimbursements are expected at the end of the school year.

NEW DIRECTOR IN JUNE

E. L. Peterson, recently appointed state director of agriculture will not assume his new duties May 15 as was his intention. A business trip will keep him out of the state most of this month.

ONE AT A TIME

Representative Ken Martin, member of the 1943 legislature, has resigned from that body that he may qualify as a member of the state game commission.

STREAMLINED STATE FAIR

Leo Spitzbart, secretary of the Oregon state fair, states that this year's fair, if any, will be streamlined possibly down to only horse races. Total expenditures for public assistance in Oregon during 1942 amounted to \$8,782,100.45 or an increase of \$339,980.59 over 1941, according to the annual report of the state welfare commission.
