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reserve on May 12, 1942. He took C.P.T. training in the spring of '42, and was the first student to solo from Madras Field in Oregon. In August of last year, he received his call to report to the army at Santa Ana, California where he stayed for six weeks. He was then sent to Mather Field to train as an instructor. Upon completion of his training and receipt of his wings there, he was sent to Randolph Field near San Antonio, Texas for special extra training as an inst-

structor. He graduated in the upper six of his class of one hundred at the Texas field and was returned to Mather Field for assignment to a base as instructor in flying when the unavoidable accident occurred.

Jack's "buddy" at Mather Field, Lt. Paul Dailey, was the driver of the car in which also riding were Dailey's wife and Lt. George Heath besides Lt. Brodie. They were driving through the dim-out section of Los Angeles. The car was going over a rise in the road and came to an abrupt ninety degree angle turn. Because of the fact that the warning sign had been knocked down the night before, there was no warning.

Lt. Robert F. Doyle, classmate of Jack's all through his flying instruction was the military escort who accompanied the body home and stayed with the family.

Lt. Brodie leaves his parents, Mr. and Mrs E. L. Jamison of Nyssa, and Mr and Mrs J. H. Brodie of Klamath Falls, Oregon. He was to have been married to Miss Hazel Hucka of Lowell, Oregon this month. Also surviving are his sister, Eris Jamison, his grandfather, A. L. Brodie of Olustee, Oklahoma, five uncles and four aunts besides many, many friends.
